Persian Song Cycle Is Brilliant Recital

"In a Persian Garden," song cycle by Liza Lehmann, based on the "Rubaiyat of Omar Khayam" was given a brilliant performance Thursday evening by Hal Young, tenor, and three of his pupils at the First Christian Church in Eugene.

John Lewis, soprano, Thelma Bearisto, contralto, and W. C. Martin, baritone, assisted in the concert which marked the final Eugene appearance of Young.

Shows Promise

Listeners commented especially on the fine voices and musicianship of Martin, an 18-year-old singer from Cottage Grove who shows great promise. The authority with which he handled his part, which was a difficult one, did him great credit.

Miss Lewis' large and clear soprano voice seemed admirably suited to her role, while Mrs. Bearisto, perhaps less experienced than the others, nevertheless sang her role musically.

Thoughtful Singing

Young himself, the audience reported, is in better voice than ever. His thoughtful singing of music which demands vocal skill made good listening.

Especially effective were the ensembles, duets and quartets. The four voices blended beautifully in the latter and on occasion sang with the volume of a large chorus.

Reitha Bauman accompanied tastefully and helpfully. The entire performance was enhanced by a reading of the Rubaiyat work before the cycle was sung.

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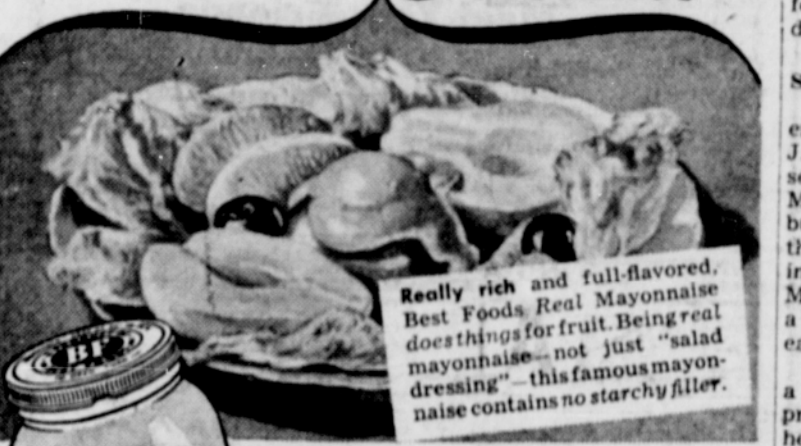
