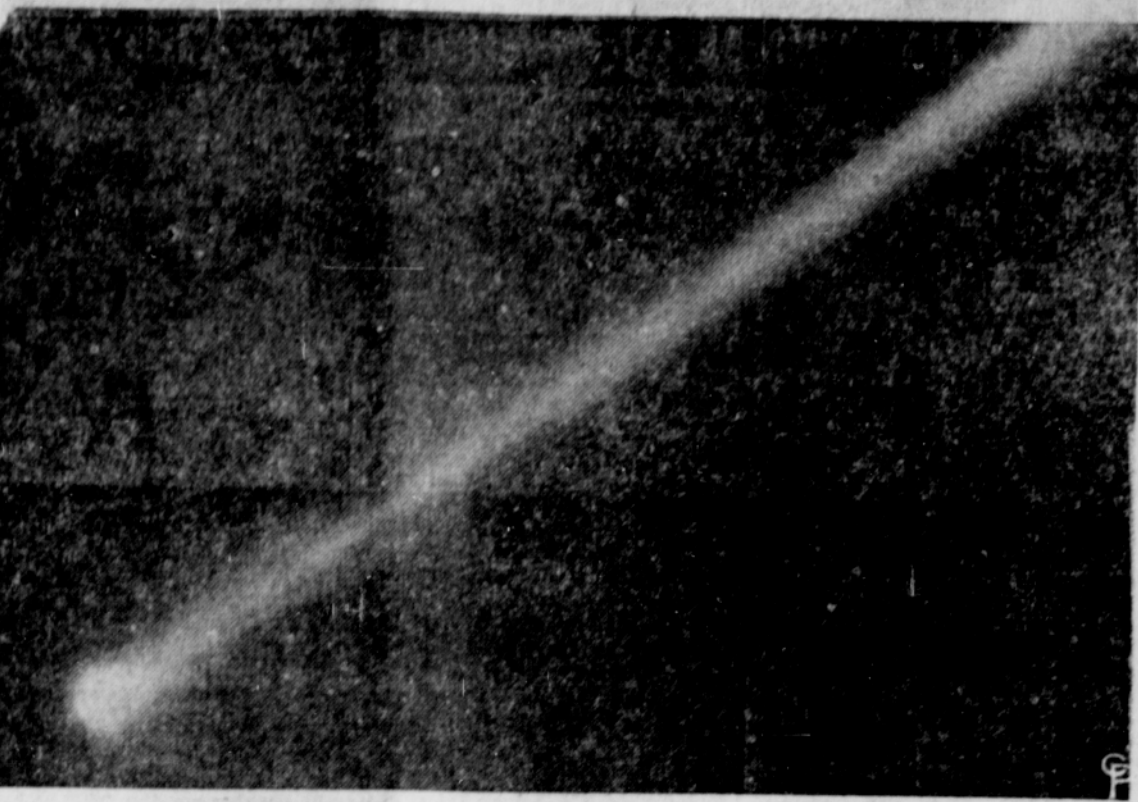

The photo, showing the comet's luminous tail, was taken by Dr. J. J. Nassau, director of the observatory at Ohio's Case University of Technology. Cattle Disease Curb
Research to develop improved methods of combating the costly cattle disease, anaplasmosis, is underway. The disease is reported to exist in 27 of our 48 states, and is particularly troublesome in southern and south central areas of the United States. The estimated national loss from anaplasmosis last year was between three and four million dollars. In Oklahoma, alone, it exceeded half a million dollars.

Canada's Indian Wards
The Canadian government employs 45 medical doctors to watch over the health and welfare of its 138,000 Indian wards scattered over thousands of square miles of Canada's inaccessible back country. There are no roads, no trains and no cities in the territory covered by some of these doctors, who often have to fly as much as 300 miles to reach one emergency patient.
