Final Rites for S. Sgt. Bill Walls Here on July 1

Final rites for S/Sgt. Bill Walls of Disston, killed in action in October 1944, will be held from the Mills mortuary Thursday, July 1, at 2:30 p.m., with the Rev. Horia Woody, of Disston, an uncle, officiating. Pallbearers will be members of the Calvin Funk post, American Legion and military honors will be given the deceased at the cemetery graveside with interment in the Masonic-IOOF cemetery.

S/Sgt. Bill Walls served as a logger in the Disston community before entering the armed services in 1942. He met his death while serving in the 7th army sector in eastern France on October 31, 1944. He was a member of Company I, 141st Infantry, 36th Division and was decorated for gallantry in action. He received the silver star for action in France and the bronze star for service in Italy. In addition he received the personal commendation from the division commander for action in Italy and also received the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster.

Prior to his service record he had lived in the Disston community for a few years and was born at Farmer, Tennessee on August 14, 1916. Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe H. Walls, brother Floyd Walls and seven sisters: Misses Vodie Walls, Norma Lee Walls, and Alice Walls, Mrs. Hazel Ballew, Mrs. Millie Belle Kephart, Mrs. Lois Hass and Mrs. Martha Jane Lance, all of Disston, and a maternal grandmother, Mrs. Martha Woody, also of Disston.
