**Cannon Company, 162 Infantry, in Training With Medium Tanks This Week at Camp Adair Area**

The Anti-Tank and Cannon Companies of the 162nd and 186th Infantry Regiments of the 41st Infantry Division left Camp Clatsop Monday by truck for Camp Adair and five days of training on medium tanks.

Twelve officers and 115 men were in the convoy that will set up camp at Adair Monday in preparation for training through Friday. Four medium tanks will be available for instruction. A team of five regular army instructors from Ft. Lewis is to be in charge of the instruction on the four medium tanks.

Troops making the movement include: Anti-Tank Company, 162nd Infantry Regiment, Dallas, commanded by Captain Richard W. Harmon; Cannon Company, 162nd Infantry Regiment, Cottage Grove, commanded by Captain Jack K. Kelly; Anti-Tank Company, 186th Infantry Regiment, Woodburn, commanded by Captain Robert E. Remy; and Cannon Company, 186th Infantry Regiment, Coos Bay, commanded by Captain Wilbur W. McDonald, Lt. Col. A. L. Howe, Corvallis Reserve Officer, on duty with the

Oregon National Guard, will be in charge of the five-day course of instruction.

Guardsmen will receive in the instruction, two hours of tank driving in addition to learning maintenance, nomenclature and mechanical training. Because of better terrain conditions in the Camp Adair area and due to flood conditions affecting rail transportation the tank camp was scheduled for the Camp Adair area.

The tank training area is to be open to visitors during the five day period, Colonel Lowe said.

**EAGLES WILL CELEBRATE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY**

Fifty years ago, six theater men sat on a lumber pile in a Seattle shipyard and organized what they called the "Seattle Order of Good Things."

The golden anniversary of that order, now known internationally as the Fraternal Order of Eagles, will be held at Seattle August 19-22. W. J. Fitzgerald, grand aerie representative in Seattle, said yesterday.

The order now has a membership of 1,350,000 in 1,700 American and Canadian cities, Fitzgerald said.

**MRS. JUDD RETURNING TO UNITED STATES**

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**Special Session Legislature Not Likely Says Hall**

Governor John H. Hall, in a telephone conversation with Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry at Salem Monday, said he does not contemplate calling a special session of the Oregon state legislature in connection with the flood disaster or for any other purpose.

The governor telephoned from Philadelphia where he is attending the Republican national convention.

Governor Hall intimated no special session will be necessary because congressional flood relief legislation is adequate to meet the state's rehabilitation needs. Earlier he had stated a special session might be called if federal aid proved inadequate.

Newbry, in the absence of Governor Hall, is acting governor.

**Oregon Game Men Hold Conference**

The third annual conference of the Game Division of the Oregon State Game Commission was in session the first of this week. Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of this week, the field agents for game from over the state met in the Portland office of the Game Commission for technical sessions and discussions.

The game men, Monday, heard C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor; Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, President of the Wildlife Management Institute; F. L. Ballard, Associate Director of the Cooperative Extension Service; A. S. Einarsen, leader of the Oregon Co-operative Wildlife Research Unit; and Fred Kennedy, Chief of Range Management for the U. S. Forest Service in this region.

W. A. Rockie, U. S. Soil Conservation Service; Joseph F. Pecharne, Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station; Norman Knott and O. L. Rensner, both of the Washington Department of Game.

Game Commissioner Larry Hilaire of Portland addressed the game men Tuesday evening.

**Re-Seeding Bluegrass Lawns**

Re-seeding of established bluegrass lawns is usually a waste of seed and effort. Even a thin stand of old bluegrass plants keeps young grass seedlings from living. If the grass is thin the mower should be set to cut high. Re-seeding is needed only in large bare spots or where it has been injured by a heavy growth of crabgrass.

**DON'T PICK UP FAWNS, GAME SUPERVISOR WARNS**

Mr. C. A. Lockwood, Oregon state game supervisor, announced today that a number of people have applied to the Game Commission office for permits to keep fawns that they have picked up in the woods. He stated that the Game Commission is reluctant to issue such permits, for few of these fawns are actually abandoned by the doe deer. It is customary, he pointed out, for the doe to hide her fawn while she is feeding and return to it at regular intervals.

"Leave the fawns alone; ninety-nine chances out of a hundred it is being well taken care of where it is," Mr. Lockwood stated.

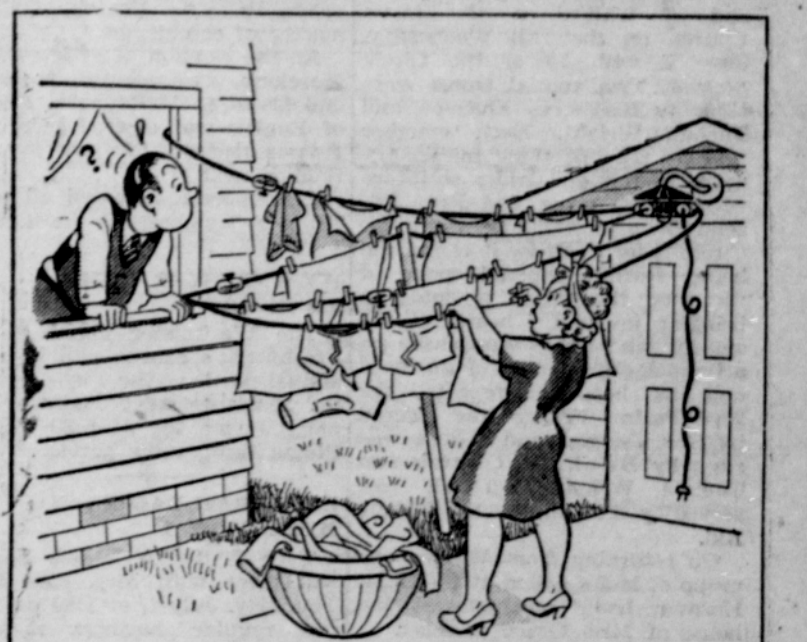
**Ironing Delicate Fabrics**

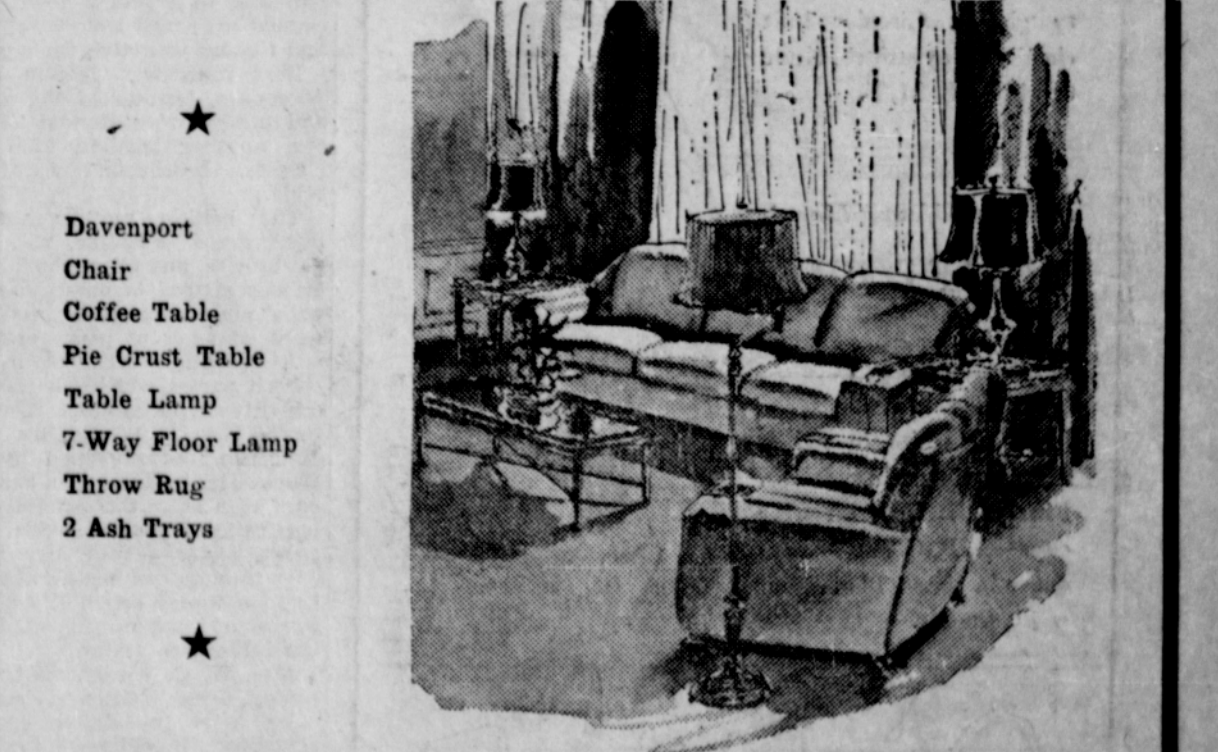
