The candlelight service was read by Kenneth Edwards, brother-in-law of the groom, who came from Colville, Washington for the occasion. Approximately 150 relatives and friends attended the wedding.

Preceding the ceremony Mrs. Tom Cauley of San Jose sang "Ah Sweet Mystery of Life," Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hughes sang "Together With Him," Mrs. Louis Black being the accompanist and playing the wedding marches. Mrs. Brenton Chapman and Miss Barbara Lemmer, in floor-length gowns of pink and green, lighted the tapers. The bride was unattended to the altar, and was preceded by little Nyla Guthrie, as flower girl and cousin of the groom, who scattered rose petals from a hand-crocheted basket in the pathway of the bride. FEDERATION OF OREGON GARDEN CLUBS MEETING

All those who attended the 20th annual meeting of the Federation of Garden clubs of Oregon were entertained royally at the sessions on June 16-17-18 which were held in the Hotel Gearhart, at Gearhart. Miss Belle Burkholder of the Eugene Garden club, and Mrs. Roy Foster and Mrs. Jackson Godard of the Cottage Grove P. D. G. Garden club attended. Wednesday night was the Beach-Combers Party held in the Sun room of the hotel. Musical numbers were enjoyed by all and also coffee and dainty sandwiches and cakes served cafeteria style. At a late hour this gathering broke up to begin the business session at 10 a.m. At 3:30 p.m. cars gathered to form a motor caravan to drive to Astoria. Over 100 cars were in line and possibly 300 or 400 persons went on this trip. We reached Astoria sometime after 4 p.m. and our first trip was to inspect a reclamation project of restoring sand dunes to usefulness. We then climbed a steep hill in switchbacks to gain the Aster Column, a monument on top of this hill commemorating the voyage overland of Lewis and Clark who first saw the Pacific ocean in 1805 at Seaside. Mrs. Elshauer, no relation to the General, who was elected this year's Federation president, attained this summit.

We arrived back at the hotel in time for the Smorgasbord dinner at 6:30 p.m. Musical programme of a Swedish nature, together with folk dances of Scandinavian origin, performed by tiny tots, was entertaining especially as they were gowned in native costumes. An Irish lady with red hair and a green dress attacked the large xylophone instrument on the stage in the banquet hall with might and main, swinging the hammers right and left with energy and enthusiasm and apparently got a big kick out of her

performance and plenty of pleases. The high point of Thursday evening was the projects show of the various clubs and these showed much work and reflected credit on those clubs who exhibited their year's work. The Herb section showing vegetable dyes to be obtained from various herbs and plants and used to dye yarn was especially interesting. Also the part showing catnip herb and its surrounding cat admirers was quite entertaining. The conservation of Myrtlewood and its various manufactured articles was well worth while and the exhibit of native Oregon orchids by the Azalea garden club of Brookings, who drove over 400 miles to come to this meeting was quite lovely and showed rare specimens of native orchids. The club will hold its Lily Pageant and Parade on July 17-18 in this southern Oregon seacoast town.

Friday was spent on a trip to Seaside and Ecola State Park near Cannon Beach. Friday night was the crowning banquet and high light of the entire meeting.
