Lane Co. Boundary Board Meets 25th

The Lane County Boundary Board meeting at Eugene Friday called a public hearing for July 12 at 10 a.m. Arguments for and against a proposed transfer of land will be heard.

A petition is on file seeking to transfer some 430 acres from the former Cloverdale School District to Creswell Union High District. The land is now in the Pleasant Hill Union High District as a result of consolidation elections that merged Cloverdale with Pleasant Hill.

In other action Thursday, the boundary board declared the official consolidations, effective July 1, of Goshen with the Springfield Union High District, and of both Lower Camp Creek and Stafford with Springfield High.

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
