Rod & Gun Club Protests Antlerless Deer Season

The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club has protested opening of the deer season in the Silver Lake area and has written a letter to the state game commission setting forth the reasons for the protest. A motion to protest the opening of the deer season in this area was passed at the regular meeting of the club Monday night. After the meeting several members of the club expressed opinion that if this practice was to continue the best deer hunting in the state would be ruined in short order. The particular tentative regulation which was approved by the commission in its session of July 10th at Portland for the antlerless deer season in the Keating area of Baker county in which 600 permits are issued for killing of one antlerless deer from December 18 to 22, was the one to come under fire at the rod and gun club meeting.

One member who has hunted in the Silver Lake area for several years says that at this particular time the snow is usually on the ground and that the deer are heavy with fawn. You don't need a gun he says for all you have to do is to walk up to your doe, take a stick and knock her in the head. Club members also had a "beef" not only for the fact that this tentative regulation would destroy the deer population, but the majority of the 600 permits are issued to residents of the Portland area. What the commission will eventually do to this protest is another matter.

In addition to the business meeting they enjoyed two movies, one on "Retrieving with Hunting Dogs" and the other on "Skiing." Members reported that the strings are on the ground for the new bridge to the proposed club house in the Walker community and that work would start this week on the club house road, preparatory to starting construction on the new club house at an early date.

Red Cross Swim Classes Exceed The Facilities

The Red Cross swim classes now being held at the Cottage Grove lake have an enrollment that exceeds the facilities. Over 180 are enrolled in either the Beginners, Intermediates, Swimmers or Junior or Senior Lifesaving. There are 120 enrolled in the beginner class alone.

Classes will last through next week. Classes are held every afternoon except on Saturday. The first bus will run at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning for beginners with the bus for the swimmers and intermediates an hour later.

The swimming program is under the direction of Wallace and Don Ciochetti and in cooperation with the summer recreational program with Bob Dusenberry as director.

Teen-Age Dance at Jefferson Gym, 16

The second teen-age dance will be held at the Jefferson school gym at 9:00 p.m. this Friday evening. The dance committee is composed of Charlene Young, chairman, Mae Malcolm, Kay Gates, and Ida Rynearson. There was a good crowd out for the first dance and plans are being made for an equally good turnout this Friday.

Approximately 120 law students took the law exams in the legislative chambers of the state capitol Tuesday and Wednesday. Early reports say about seventy percent of the students will pass the exams.

(Bud) Husted, local manager of the Shell Oil Co. for the past five years here, decided it was not worth the effort to keep trying for the presidency of the Shell Oil Co., and has resigned his position effective today to join Ralph Saltzman in the operation of the Perfection Planers at Leona. Husted is succeeded by Robert F. Upson, formerly of Albany, who takes over today. Husted has been with the Shell Oil Co. for the past sixteen years. Workmen have completely rebuilt the former Pass Creek Remanufacturing plant at Leona the past three weeks. Ralph Saltzman was formerly associated with the S. & F. Lumber Co.

City Budget to Be Put Up to Voters Third Time Aug. 5

The 1948-49 budget calling for an expenditure of \$16,488.47 over the six percent limitation will be put up to the voters for approval at a special election. Or rather the issue will go before the people for the third time. At the first election May 11th, voters were asked to approve a budget of approximately \$18,000 above the six percent. After the city manager revised downward some \$2,000 and placed before the voters again on July 9th. At this time the issue was defeated 112 to 109.

Decision to again place the issue before the public was made at a budget committee meeting Monday evening at the council chambers of the city hall and after considerable discussion. A member of the budget committee said Tuesday morning that the council was inclined to cut the budget back to the six percent limitation and let the matter go at that, but were prevailed on to reconsider and finally approved the issue, which is unchanged from that voted on July 9th, except for the date of voting, which is August 5th.

Decision of the budget committee to place the budget to a vote of the people for the third time was influenced by two factors. The first was that the town has approximately doubled in population since 1940, on which the greater part of the present budget is based and secondly living costs have advanced a 100 percent since the 1940 date. Something over \$11,000 of the budget to be voted on will be used on streets, if approved. During the war and up to the present time there has been little or no funds available for new streets or street repairs and the longer street repairs are neglected, the most costly will be the repairs.

Coiner, city engineer announced last week that the construction contract awarded the Inter-city Sand and Gravel Co., for building nineteen and a half miles of new line had been completed. The line is completed to near Rutada and the entire project will be finished as soon as it is determined what type of filter will be used.

Virgil Kingsley Chosen Head of Union Hi School

Virgil Kingsley, present superintendent of the Junction City schools, was chosen by the Union High School board last night as superintendent of the Union High school from among several other applicants. Kingsley has been with the Junction City school system for the past five years and previous to this was with the Oakridge schools for six years.

A graduate of the University of Oregon, Kingsley will receive his master's degree this fall. He has a wife and four children. Mrs. Kingsley is the former Connie Mote who lived here for a number of years and is well known to a number of local people.

Mr. Kingsley who is expected to move here shortly is looking for living quarters.

Cecil Caldwell was selected as clerk of the board last night. Decision to do away with the position of high school principal was also made at the meeting and tentative plans have been made to employ a dean of men and a dean of women, but these selections will not probably be made until the start of school or after.

Eisenhower Trophy To Winning Unit National Guard

General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower, former Army Chief of Staff, who, as Supreme Commander, led the Allied Forces to victory in Europe, will give his name to a trophy to be awarded the outstanding Army unit of the National Guard in each State, Major General Thomas E. Riley announced recently.

The Eisenhower Trophy will be in the form of a cup fifteen inches high. It will be a perpetual award given annually, and the winning unit each year will be given a smaller replica for permanent possession.

"Only Army units of the National Guard which have attained 100 per cent of the enlisted strength will be considered for the award in each state," Major General Thomas E. Riley said.

Rodeo Queen Will Be Selected at Ball Sat., July 17th

The Rodeo Queen will be selected at the Queen's Ball to be held Saturday night at the local armory. There are four princesses running for the queen's place; one will be selected queen and the other three will be princesses. The Creswell Riding club is sponsoring Rose Marie Malone of Creswell; the Arizona Ranch Hands are sponsoring Clara Barrett of Lowell; the Girls' Posse is sponsoring Janice Billings of Eugene and the Cottage Grove Riding club is sponsoring Doreen Lyon of Cottage Grove. Each dance ticket that a princess sells counts for votes for her. Tickets will be sold up to eight o'clock Saturday evening. The queen will reign during the rodeo being sponsored by the Cottage Grove Riding club on July 31 and August 1. She will be escorted by her three princesses. She is to be crowned during the dance Saturday night, by Wally Robertson, president of the Chamber of Commerce. The Arizona Ranch Hands have been engaged to play for the Queen's Ball. They will also play for the Rodeo dance to be held July 31 at the armory.

Interest in the rodeo which will include both professional and amateur events is quite widespread. Posters have been placed in nearly every major city in the state and inquiries have been received from several quite distant places including eastern Oregon.

The Creswell Riding club has made arrangements to bring 40 horses down and the group will camp at the Rodeo grounds, a half mile south on highway 99. The chutes have been erected at the rodeo grounds and carpenters are in the process of building the bleachers. The track will be completed this week. The program will include all the major attractions for professionals including brahma bull riding and fighting, calf roping and saddle bronc riding, calf roping and bulldogging. For the amateurs there will be bareback riding and steer riding, a quarter horse race, stake race for saddle clubs, half mile race, quarter mile race for boys, quarter mile stock horse race for girls and a three-eighths relay race. Entry fees will be collected for each event and cash prizes will be awarded.

The rodeo stock will be furnished by Christensen Brothers who own some of the best rodeo stock in the United States. Points earned by professionals in the rodeo count toward the world's championships. Mrs. Grace Markham of Eugene has been assisting the club by soliciting advertising for the rodeo programs. She was in charge of the advertising for the Junior Rodeo and has had some other experience in this field.

She is also a contralto soloist heard on many large network broadcasts and has recorded for sacred recording corporations.

The new director is Paul Arthur, director of the upstate region, Youth for Christ, who will also be present at this first rally in Cottage Grove.

Bank Deposits Here Reach New High \$7,599,548

Continued mounting bank deposits here indicate the economic growth of the section as the year probably reflect the path of inflation. A gain over \$1,000,000 in deposits in the past year is shown in the report of condition as of June 30, 1948 of the First National Bank. The gain is nearly a million and a quarter dollars and substantiates the claim that the deposits have shown about a million dollar gain per year for the past seven years.

Deposits as of June 30, 1948 totaled \$7,599,548.91 on June 30, 1948 as compared with a total of \$6,371,999.91 at the corresponding period of last year. Bank loans have also jumped two hundred thousand from \$554,628.29 in 1947 to \$791,171.16 in 1948.

Pres. Truman Named Head of Democrats

President Harry Truman was nominated last night by the democrats at Philadelphia on a strong civil rights program which threatened a north and south split. He defeated Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia 947 1/2 to 263. Sen. Alben Barkley of Kentucky was named vice president and soon thereafter

many of the southern democrats took a walk and late last night announced a southern convention to be held at Atlanta, Georgia next Saturday.

In his acceptance speech, President Truman called to the republicans to enact legislation which was called for in the republican platform. The president called congress to reconvene on July 26th and said he expected the republicans of congress to carry out their platform on housing, education and price controls.

After adopting a strong civil rights platform, all of the Mississippi delegates and thirteen of Alabama's 26 packed up and left the convention hall.

The Tony Gagner Home Destroyed By Fire July 13

The Francis (Tony) Gagner home, two miles southwest from the Skelton store, or about four miles southwest from Cottage Grove was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday evening about 6:00 p.m. Mr. Gagner attempted to light an oil stove after filling the stove and spilling some oil on the floor of the two room log cabin. When she attempted to light the stove, it went up in a mass of flames. It was said Mrs. Gagner ran to the home of a neighbor, some distance away, to give the alarm. By the time the rural fire truck could answer the call, the roof of the cabin had fallen in. The building and contents was a total loss. Included in the loss was some new furniture. The amount of the loss was said to have been \$3,000. No insurance was carried either on the building or contents, it was understood.

Rites for Roy O. Garoutte 55 of Stanfield, Oregon were held Thursday at 2:00 p.m. from the Folsom chapel in Pendleton. Mr. Garoutte died suddenly of a heart attack at his home the morning of July 5. The Rev. Alfred E. Vosper of the Hermiston Methodist church officiated.

He lived around the Pilot Rock district for the past thirty seven years. He was a veteran of World War I.

Surviving are his widow; two sons, Byron J. of Stanfield and George L. with the army airforce in Germany; a daughter, Eileen of Stanfield. His father, M. R. Garoutte of Riverside, Calif., four sisters, Mrs. Tressa Tullar and Mrs. Roy Ewing of Cottage Grove, Mrs. James Powell of Oakland and Mrs. John Weber of Chat Colet, Idaho; two brothers, Joe of Waldport and Lon of Astabula, Oregon and two grandchildren.

SUTHERLIN APPROVES LEVY Sutherland citizens approved, by a vote of 19 to 2, Friday, a tax law exceeding the constitutional six per cent tax limitation by \$4,880. City Recorder William A. Crowell of Sutherland reported today.

The total city budget for the coming fiscal year will be \$140,878.20. The amount of taxation within the six per cent limitation will be \$11,331.80. Crowell said it was the first time that the city has found it necessary to exceed the limitation. — Roseburg News Review.
