## Season Tickets On Sale for U. of O. Football Games

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, July 13 (Special)—Season tickets to all University of Oregon football games went on sale this week to the general public. The \$12.25 ticket includes four games—Santa Barbara at Eugene September 18, University of Southern California at Portland October 16, Washington State College at Eugene (Homecoming) October 23, and St. Mary's at Eugene October 30.

In putting the tickets on sale, Athletic Director Leo Harris emphasized that no tickets for individual games will be sold until all season ticket requests are filled. With a heavy demand for tickets already indicated, only a limited number of tickets probably will be available for individual games, Harris said.

All requests for tickets are handled on a strict chronological basis, in the order received. Each application is stamped with the date received and a number indicating its place on the list. When applications are filled, assignments are made in accordance with the list.

The new ticket policy was worked out by members of the athletic department, the Oregon Alumni association and other interested groups. By the 1949 season, the University hopes to increase the seating capacity of Hayward field in Eugene by 7000 seats to more adequately take care of requests.

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## Tentative Hunting Regulations Set By Commission 10

The hunting seasons for the year 1948 were tentatively set by the Oregon State Game Commission, July 10. The Commission will meet July 24, to make what changes are deemed necessary and authorize the final regulations.

The tentative hunting regulations areas follows:

Ringneck Pheasant — General Season: From noon October 29 to October 31, inclusive. Bag limit, 1 cock a day but not more than two cocks during the season.

All counties open except Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Washington, Yamhill, Jefferson.

Special Pheasant Season, Summer Lake Valley Pheasant Area: Open season concurrent with waterfowl. Bag limit, two pheasants of either sex per day but not more than four in possession.

Refuge: Multnomah-Clackamas game refuge to be open for pheasant hunting during open season.

Valley Quail: Season concurrent with pheasant season in Coos, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sheridan, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Grant, and Harney counties. Bag limit — 5 valley quail per day but not more than 10 in possession.

Blue Grouse: Season October 1 to 20 (concurrent with deer) in Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Lincoln, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Coos and Curry counties. Bag limit — five in possession.

Open season entire year in Columbia, Washington, Multnomah, Clackamas, Marion, Yamhill and Polk counties.

Migratory Game Birds  
Doves: Season and limit to be as set by federal government. Open season in following counties only: Harney, Lake, Deschutes, Wheeler, Crook, Jackson and Josephine.

Bandtail Pigeon: Season to be as set by federal government. Bag limit, 8 birds a day or in possession.

Waterfowl: Regulations to be as set by federal government.

## Cotton Insect Damage

Cotton insects destroyed 15.1 per cent of the 1946 crop, according to a report of the bureau of agricultural economics. In addition to lint, this meant 613,000 tons of cotton seed which would have produced 200 million pounds of margarine, 276,000 tons of high protein meal, and 152,000 tons of cottonseed hulls. Meal loss to insects would have provided sufficient protein for 178 million pounds of beef or 690 million gallons of milk.

## FLAGG PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSIONER

SALEM, Ore. — Public Utilities Commissioner John H. Carlin resigned yesterday, and George H. Flagg was appointed by Governor John H. Hall to succeed him.

Carlin has held the PUC position only since last March 3, when Hall forced Flagg to resign as Public Utilities Commissioner because Flagg was running for secretary of state.
