Irrigate Gardens More When Crops Reach Maturity

Increasingly heavy irrigations now will pay off in greater garden truck dividends later, reminds Arthur S. King, OSC extension soils specialist, who points out that garden vegetable water requirements increase as the crops approach maturity. Oregon summer showers seldom are heavy enough to affect the irrigation schedule.

King says the common garden vegetables vary a great deal in their response to water. If only a limited amount of water is available, the soils specialist suggests that it be applied on crops that need it most such as cucumbers, pole beans and tomatoes. Water on these crops improves quality and keeps the plants bearing continuously over a long period of time, thus giving a high return for water applied.

Examples of crops that produce fair yields without water are corn, pumpkins and squash. King points out, however, that anyone who has eaten irrigated sweet corn, for example, is seldom ever satisfied again with non-irrigated corn.

There are other crops that can be grown during the early summer without watering, but irrigation makes successive plantings possible. These types of garden crops include cabbage, carrots, onions, and other short-lived plants.

With any of the crops, the need for water increases as the crop approaches maturity, King states. Pole beans, for example, may require only one or two waterings until the first bloom. Then, to keep the crop coming pole beans need water every week, perhaps twice a week during hot weather.

As an easy sign to know when plants are in need of additional water, King offers this test: When plant leaves begin to droop or wilt during hot afternoons, it is a sign that the supply of soil moisture is getting low and it is time to irrigate.

Although considerable argument has been registered concerning the relative merits of day or night irrigation, King states that most crops react favorably to either. There is little or no damage even from sprinkling during an extremely hot day, he concludes.

1400 Lane County Farmers Members Of AC Program

The 1400 farmers of Lane county who are participating in the Agricultural Conservation Program are cooperating with farmers in all of the agricultural counties of the United States, says Ernest E. Schrenk, chairman of the county ACA committee.

Farmers through their ACA committees are carrying out farming practices to conserve soil and water in every county in the United States, except the 23 counties which are non-agricultural. In Lane County the main conservation practices being carried out by farmers are: green manure crops on cropland and orchard; construction of open-ditch drain lines and tile drainage systems; seeding and reseeded of approved permanent pasture mixtures; application of nitrogen to new pasture seedings and green manure crops to insure a stand; application of lime to acid soils; control and eradication of perennial noxious weeds, principally Canada thistle and morning glory; and construction of erosion control dams, rip-rap and sod waterways.

Under the Agricultural Conservation Program, farmers are encouraged and helped in carrying out the various approved conservation practices. Assistance is in the form of materials, services and financial aid. Technical committees made up of specialists from Experiment Stations, Extension Service, State Departments of Agriculture and others review and help write the specifications for approved practices.

Farmer-elected committees administer the program in all the communities and counties where the program is in operation.

Mr. Schrenk cites three reasons for the program:

First, the need for soil and water conservation is urgent. Food producing land is limited. Population is increasing and soil must be saved now. Assistance under the Agricultural Conservation Program has proved the most effective way of getting the needed conservation.

Second, responsibility for conserving our soil and water resources is national. Everyone depends on the products of the soil and everyone should have a share in the responsibility of protecting the present and future food supplies. Through the ACP consumers and producers share the cost of the conservation practices. This year that cost is about \$1.00 per person. The farmer matches that—and then contributes the necessary work.

Third, it's the most economical way of getting the needed conservation work done. Erosion, if let go, becomes more expensive to correct with each passing year. Not only is there a bigger job to do but the soil lost cannot be restored.

Major Fire Laws Summarized for Farmer Guidance

Now that the danger season for forest fires is approaching, a digest of the Oregon forest fire laws that apply particularly to farmers and woodlot owners has been prepared by Charles R. Ross, O. S. C. extension forester.

In summarizing seven of the more significant laws, Ross has attempted to give the highlights as they apply to farmers and rural residents. The summary follows:

The Permit Law: Persons who wish to burn forest land, grass, grain stubble or stumps must secure written permission from a fire warden during the closed season which normally runs from May 15 to December 31.

Cigarette and Match Law: During the closed season, it is unlawful for anyone to throw away lighted tobacco, matches or other material on any forest land, private road, public highway or railroad right of way.

Campfire Law: Persons building campfires on land not their own are required to clear the ground immediately around the fire. Campfires must not be left unattended.

Willful Setting of Fire: Persons convicted of setting incendiary fires are liable to prison sentences. Operator's Permit Law: Anyone desiring to use fire or to use power driven machinery in connection with logging on or within one-eighth mile of forest land is required to get a permit annually from the State Forester.

Slash Burning Law: Individuals or companies that harvest forest products are required to burn slash each year if it is a fire hazard. The burning is supervised by fire wardens. Land owners share in the responsibility for reducing slash hazards on their lands.

Closure Law: The governor's proclamation may totally or partially close such forest areas to all forms of use where fire danger is considered especially dangerous.

The number of livestock on U. S. farms has been declining continuously since the peak was reached in 1944. The drop in 1947 included a reduction of 933,000 head of dairy cows.

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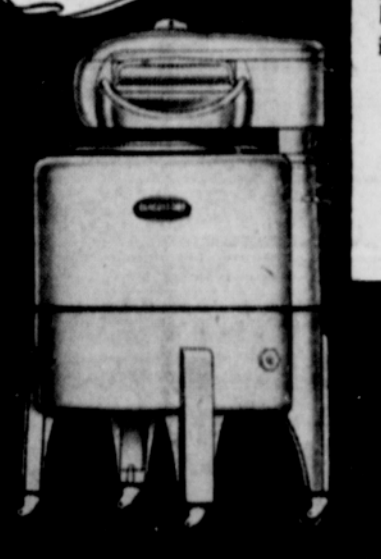
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
