New Blackberry Here!
A new blackberry variety especially suited for freezing has been developed at Oregon state college experiment station. The new variety, called Chehalis, is a cross between the Santiam and the Himalaya. Outstanding characteristic of the Chehalis is its bright black glossy color, which is retained in both freezing and canning.
