Timber Hearing At Eugene on September 7 to 10

U. S. Senator Guy Cordon, Ore., has notified Western Forest Industries Association that a subcommittee of the Senate committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, of which he is a member, will hold hearings in Eugene September 7, 8, 9, 10 on the administration of O & C lands by the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior. The hearing had been requested by many independent lumbermen, farm groups and commercial organizations who claimed that the Interior Department was discriminating against certain communities and smaller operators in the sale of public timber and in proposing to enter into long-term cooperative agreements with selected private timberland owners which would give them exclusive cutting rights on large areas of O & C timber. According to Senator Cordon interested parties who expect to appear as witnesses at the hearing will be asked to file written statements with the Committee in Washington, D. C. by August 15.

World President of SDA Churches at State Convention

The Cottage Grove Seventh-day Adventist church, will be represented at the denomination's annual statewide campmeeting at Gladstone, Oregon, just outside of Portland, July 14-25.
A. D. Chilson, pastor of the church here, will attend, and local delegates to the state convention are Mrs. Grace Qualls, Alice Pattee, William Decker and Ralph Williams. They will vote at the State Conference's biennial business meeting to be held at the session. Other members of the church will be in attendance, particularly on week ends.
The Oregon Adventist Campmeeting is one of the largest religious gatherings of the Northwest, with 6,000 to 7,000 living on the 73 acre Gladstone camp, and an estimated 11,000 to 12,000 attending on week ends. 1700 cabins and tents are ready for occupancy by the thousands who will converge on the camp for the opening on July 14.

Elder Lloyd E. Biggs, Oregon State President of the church, is leading out in the organization and program of this huge encampment, which includes a continuous series of meetings and special features from 6:30 each morning until the end of the evening session at 9:20, in six different auditoriums and meeting halls.
"Campmeeting is one of the strong traditions of the Adventist church and is an occasion for spiritual and inspirational uplift for young and old," says Elder Biggs. High-ranking officers of the denomination, including Elder J. L. McElhaney, world president of the church, will speak.
Adventist Campmeetings have been held in Oregon since 1877.
Young people from the Cottage Grove Adventist church expect to attend the Pacific Northwest Youth Congress to be held immediately following the encampment at Gladstone, and will be attended by several thousand youth from five northwest states.
