Rev. Jos. Beatty Services Tuesday

Rev. Joseph Lanning Beatty, 95, of 608 Gibbs avenue, passed away Friday, July 16, 1948, at the Masonic Home, Forest Grove. The Rev. Beatty was a pioneer minister and circuit rider, serving as a minister for over 47 years. He was born August 28, 1852, at Trenton, New Jersey, and married Elsie McKnight, May 31, 1875, at Niffintown, Pennsylvania. To this union four children were born. They observed their golden wedding anniversary in 1925, and she passed away in 1926.

The Rev. Beatty was a circuit rider in Iowa, after which he moved to North Dakota and from there to Oregon in 1902 to serve as a missionary to the Indians on the Klamath reservation. He spent ten years on the reservation, and the town of Beatty in Klamath county was named for the Rev. Beatty.

At one time he was pastor of the Methodist church in Cottage Grove and returned here as a retired minister in 1916 to make his home.

In 1928 he married Ellen Kefauver, who passed away in 1934. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and Masonic lodge.

He is survived by four children: Mrs. Helen Heath of Albany, Oregon; the Rev. William T. Beatty, Newport, Washington, Mrs. Marion Birtchett, Chicago, Illinois, and Mrs. Frances Raeknor, Cottage Grove, 15 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, July 20, at 2:30 from Mills Mortuary with the Rev. D. Hugh Peniston officiating. Burial was in the local Masonic-100F cemetery.

Liquor Handling Fee May Be Uppeped

PORTLAND—The State Liquor Control Commission, after ordering bartender licensing into effect Nov. 1, Friday was considering additional fee-raising.

The proposal was to increase fees to restaurants, taverns and groceries that handle alcoholic beverages.

"The license fees are too small," Commissioner Joseph Freck told the League of Oregon Cities, which also favors higher fees. The cities received a share of the fee income.

William H. Hammond, liquor administrator, said fees in other states run up to \$1000 while Oregon's top is \$250. A new fee schedule is expected to be submitted to the 1949 state legislature.

Under the bartender licensing all employees who sell, serve or mix alcoholic drinks must get the \$1 license. This will not apply, however, to clerks handling packaged goods, nor in restaurants where liquor sales are less than 10 per cent of total food sales.

The measure was designed for closer control of persons handling liquor.

Labor Saving to Be Featured at Poultry Meeting

All Oregon poultrymen are invited to participate in the annual meeting of the Oregon Poultry Improvement association in Corvallis on August 3, regardless of whether they are association members, it was announced this week by Lloyd A. Lee, Salem, association president. The meeting will be held at the Benton hotel starting at 10:00 a.m.

Featured speaker on the August 3 program will be G. T. Klein, extension poultryman from the University of Massachusetts, who is nationally known authority on poultry subjects. Klein's subject on the afternoon program will be "Saving Labor on Poultry Farms and in Hatcheries." In the evening, he will address the association's annual banquet on the subject of "Breeding for Meat and Eggs."

Other program items include discussion of fertility in chickens, by J. E. Parker, O.S.S. poultry department head; a flock improvement program, by Paul Bernier, college poultry geneticist; a talk on modern trends in poultry production, by Fred Cockrell, Milwaukee; and a report of the national plan conference, by Dr. C. E. Holmes, Milwaukee.

The association's annual business meeting and a tour of the college poultry plant and range will complete the session.

A pullover testing and flock selecting school for persons who expect to qualify as authorized testing and selecting agents under the Oregon poultry improvement plan will be held at the O.S.C. poultry building on August 4 and 5, according to N. L. Bennion, extension poultryman. Lectures on August 4 will be followed by practical examinations and a written examination on August 5. Attendance will be limited.

HAY FIRE AT RANDALL FARM

Fire starting from a cigarette thrown in some hay in the Vinal Randall hay field Saturday afternoon burned 16 bales of hay and a quantity of loose hay before the fire could be extinguished. Fire burned over about an acre of ground and threatened to spread to pasture land before being brought under control. The fire is said to have been started when a cigarette was thrown into the hay during baling operations.

TRIANGLE LAKE FIRE CONTROLLED

A forest fire started on the Nash Logging operations a mile west of Triangle Lake Friday was reported under control Saturday. The fire involved about 80 acres and 35 men were used to fight the fire.

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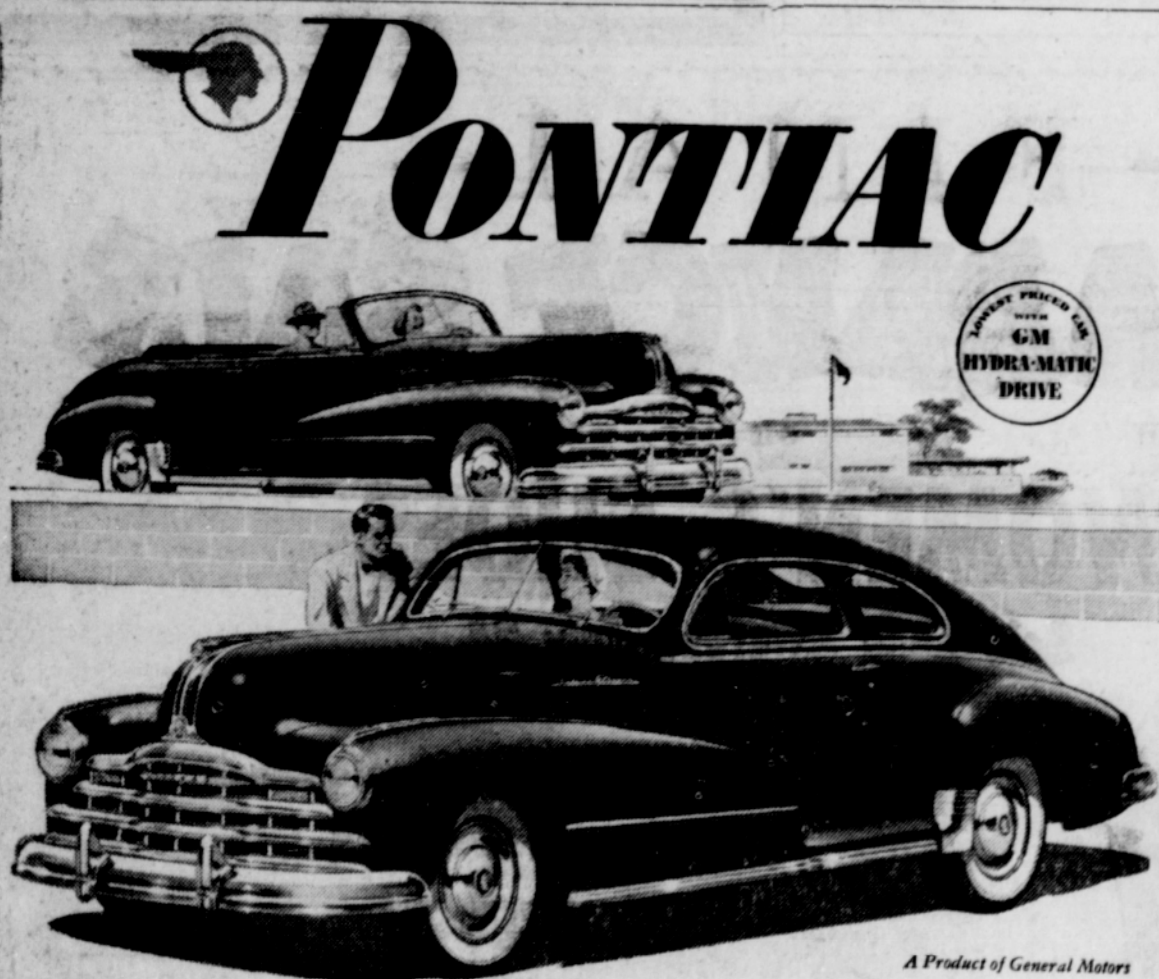
