Hayhurst Valley Man Killed at Grade Crossing

Alighting from his truck when it stalled on the Southern Pacific railway crossing at the Fred Thompson sawmill a mile north of Yoncalla, William M. Luster, 48, of Hayhurst valley, near Yoncalla, was killed Sunday at 9:28 a.m., when struck by a lone switch engine, State Police reported.

Engineer Edward W. Montgomery, Roseburg, according to Sgt. Harrell, said the engine was traveling south at about 15 miles per hour. He said he saw the truck backing onto the track when the engine was about 250 feet away. The truck, he said was unable to move off the track in time to prevent being hit.

Luster, Sgt. Harrell said, is reported to have climbed out of the truck in an attempt to escape. His body was crushed beneath the locomotive which struck the truck and which traveled 183 feet from the crossing before it was brought to a halt.

The mangled body remained under the locomotive until Coroner Harry C. Stearns arrived. It was then necessary to move the engine backward several feet before the body could be removed.

The truck, damaged by the engine impact, was a 1935 Ford pickup, owned by S. E. Elwood of Drain, Luster was alone.

The fireman on the engine with Montgomery was Alvah Cramer, also of Roseburg. Witnesses to the accident were Ernest Thiele and his son-in-law and daughter, who were driving by at the time.

Coroner Harry C. Stearns, Oakland, reported there will probably be an inquest in connection with the accident.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. at the Methodist Church at Yoncalla, with Rev. W. Byers of Drain officiating. The Stearns Mortuary of Oakland is in charge. — Roseburg News Review.

Gen. L. Hershey To Direct Draft

WASHINGTON, President Truman Saturday appointed Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey director of selective service. He will supervise the registration of youths between 19 and 26 under the new peacetime draft act. Gen. Hershey was head of selective service during the last war.

The White house said the president will issue early next week an executive order dealing with resignation.

Many details are yet to be announced, including the order in which the youths will be called.

Registration generally is expected to start Aug. 16. Males from 18 through 25 will have to register, but only those 19 through 25 will be subject to the draft.

The 18-year-olds will be subject to draft when they reach their 19th birthday. However, 161,000 of them will be permitted to volunteer for a special one-year hitch in the armed services to avoid being drafted when they become 19. They also must follow their term of service with a longer period in the reserves under the provision allowing them to volunteer.

Secretary of Defense Forrestal announced that volunteering of 18-year-olds will be started Wednesday, July 21. For the first four weeks after that date the Army will accept 10,000; the Navy and Marines 3,000; and the Air Force 1,300.

Selective Service is busy organizing draft machinery which will include about 4,000 draft boards. Draft machinery has been kept in force on a sort of standby basis since drafting was discontinued after the end of World War II hostilities.

Actual induction, under the law, cannot start before Sept. 22.

Jr. College Work Assured Draftees

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Men of draft age planning to enter college this fall need have no fear of having their work interrupted before the end of the school year, if they do satisfactory work, reports President A. L. Strand in a brief analysis of provisions of the selective service law as they affect students.

President Strand recently returned from a meeting of the executive committee of the Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities where the matter was discussed in considerable detail. He learned also that the military

authorities are planning to increase the size of ROTC units in colleges and depend on them as the primary source of officer material.

Oregon State and many other colleges open this fall before the selective service act becomes effective. Any students enrolled at that time are exempt under the act until the college year is completed—assuming good scholastic work.

Those enrolled in advanced ROTC units, as juniors and seniors, are exempt, as they qualify for reserve commissions on graduation. The army is also starting a new plan this fall whereby freshmen in basic ROTC courses will have opportunity to sign an agreement to continue through advanced work to a commission and

then serve two years in active duty if called. Those signing the agreement would not be subject to selective service.
