A. F. of L. Lumber Workers To Ask For Pay Hike

The Willamette Valley district council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, A. F. of L., will ask for wage increase in future negotiations, as the result of action taken at a weekend meeting of the council at Eugene Sunday. The decision was based on continued increases in the cost of living.

The last boost for the lumber and sawmill workers was effective April 1, when an increase of five cents per hour was granted. New negotiations are expected to open before Aug. 10.

Health and welfare plans and retirement pay were also discussed, but details of the proposals have not been drafted completely.

MASON RIDER HURT AT CORVALLIS JULY 17th

Miss Terry Sullivan of Springfield, rider of the Roy Mason horse "Sheba Heba" was painfully hurt at Corvallis Saturday while riding in the Corvallis rodeo. Miss Sullivan was leading a field of seven in the Corvallis handicap when her saddle slipped and she fell from her mount. Fortunately other horses in the race missed her as she lay on the track. She was carried to a Corvallis hospital suffering from bruises and shock and cut lip. Early reports indicate that her condition is not serious.

Laying-Adams Cr. Are Closed To Unregulated Use

Portions of the Bohemia area east of Cottage Grove have been closed to unrestricted use except on entry permit issued at the Laying Creek Ranger Station or by a fire warden, according to a proclamation published in this issue of the Sentinel and signed by Governor Hall.

Those wishing to enter the closed areas are required to comply with the following requirements. To refrain from smoking except in areas designated for such, to build no open fires except in designated places and to have tools suitable for extinguishing fires when building camp fires.

The order is effective July 23 and runs to December 31st. See the proclamation appearing elsewhere in this issue for details.

Thousands To Join In Trek To St. Mary's Peak Aug. 1

People by the thousands will join in a pilgrimage to 4100-foot Mary's Peak, 25 miles west of Corvallis, when the Shrine clubs of four Oregon counties stage their annual trek to the peak on August 1 for the benefit of crippled children.

The trek, the third of its kind, will provide a day of entertainment for young and old alike in the natural amphitheatre atop the mountain, highest in the Oregon coast range.

Monte Blue, veteran screen star, will emcee the program, which will include two air shows, four bands and a drum and bugle corps, a stage show, and an Oregon centennial address by Ernest Haycox, noted author.

Enough beef to feed 5000 persons is being barbecued for the day and will be sold at 50 cents a plate. Bread, coffee and cream will be served free of charge.

Mounted Route For City To Be Started Aug. 2

The mounted city mail route will be started Monday August 2. N. J. Nelson, postmaster announced yesterday. He said: "City mail service will be given to all those who have complied with requirements. Such requirements are house numbers. The name and house number must be on the mail box. The box must conform to the standard set for a rural mail box which is: Box should be fastened securely on a post and the post should be three feet nine inches high and placed in the most convenient place for the carrier to drive to the box."

Postmaster Nelson is calling on each patron by the route. It will perhaps be another week before all patrons will be advised how to prepare for the new method of delivery. In the meantime be patient until you are given a house number and told where to place your mail box.

Philip E. Norton Drowns In Pond

Phillip Ellsworth Norton, 27, of Lorane, 15 miles west of Cottage Grove, was drowned Thursday morning, July 29, when he lost his balance while working in a mill pond at the Huggins-Weaver mill at Lorane, Coroner Phil Bartholomew reported.

Members of the crew attempted to give Norton artificial respiration but he was dead upon the arrival of the Arrow ambulance. Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold E. Norton; three brothers, David, Robert, and George, all of Lorane; and one sister, Mrs. Virginia Wade of Waterville, Washington.

Funeral services will be announced from the Veatch Hollingsworth England chapel.

Youth Killed, Two Injured In Car Plunge Sunday

An 18-year-old youth was killed and two passengers were hospitalized when a car went out of control and hurtled over a 68 foot embankment on the South Umpqua River about two and one half miles east of Milo near Days Creek, Sunday about midnight, according to a State Police report.

The driver, reported by State Police Patrolman Fred L. Perry to be James Hurst, of Tiller, was killed. Mrs. Norma Hinshaw, Canyonville, and Kenneth Christman, Tiller sustained slight injuries. They were taken by ambulance to the Myrtle Creek Hospital for treatment. —Roseburg News Review.

Ore. Motor Vehicle Registration Now At All-Time High

Oregon motor vehicle registrations have climbed to a total of 549,671 cars, trucks, busses, and motorcycles for a new all-time high at the mid-year point, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has announced.

Registrations for the first six months of the year are 10 per cent higher than the total for the same period in 1947. More than twelve thousand additional vehicles were registered in June. Passenger cars, now listed at 418,198, accounted for the greatest share of the increase, Newbry said.

Trick Ropers, Parade To Fete Rodeo July 31 Aug 1

Town Is Full Of Would-Be Cowboys For Rodeo Sat-Sun.

The past week the town has been full of "would be" cowboys but if you want to see the real thing go out to the rodeo grounds one half mile south of town on highway 99. The rodeo grounds look like a new trailer camp with so many trailers parked out there. Many of the professional cow boys who make their living by following the rodeo circuits make their homes in trailer houses. Possibly one of the best known rodeo men out at the ground is Gene Payne who will announce our show. Gene's home town is in Tucson, Arizona. This year he has been announcing some of the major eastern shows and just came back to announce the Cottage Grove and Corvallis shows. Ed Faulk of Starrington, Wyoming is also here. He was high man at the Ak-Sar-Ben show in Omaha, Neb. last year. Bud Spence of Omaha, Wash. is world championship decorator (in Canada they are called decorators rather than bulldozers as in this country).

Stub Barthelmey of White Salmon, Washington will be one of the judges. He broke his leg about three weeks ago and is unable to participate. He won Madison Square Garden one year and took the saddle bronc riding there two years ago. He has only been bucked off his bronc six times since 1941.

One of the most promising young cow boys on the coast is eighteen year old Tuffy Federer of Cheyenne, Wyoming, who is a saddle bronc rider. Larry Daniels of Lewiston, Idaho is an all around cow boy entering all events. He has numerous all around championships. He was the first man ever to ride Yellow Jacket (a brahma bull): Yellow Jacket has only been ridden three times and Larry rode him two times.

Christensen Brothers, who are furnishing the stock for our show are one of the two best owners of rodeo stock. They have furnished stock for the Western Washington fair, the California fair the Oregon State Fair and the Pacific International at Portland.

At a recent show out of twenty-two saddle bronc put through the chutes there were only three qualified riders. They have brought here Leppy a brahma bull who is as yet unridden this year.

Mark on your calendar, Saturday July 31 and Sunday, August 1, two days of rodeo you can't afford to miss.

Herb Adams Buys His Former Station

Herb Adams announced today that he had re-purchased his former Union Oil station from Carl J. Madsen, located at 6th and the highway, and will be owner and operator of the station again.

Two weeks ago Mr. Adams sold his interest to Carl J. Madsen, and the following day Mr. Madsen had his leg broken, and was taken to a Eugene hospital, after which he was stricken with meningitis. Due to his health he is not able to run the station at this time.

Mr. and Mrs. Jaul St. Croix, trick ropers and riders have been secured to perform at the rodeo being sponsored by the Cottage Grove Riding Club on Saturday July 31 and Sunday August 1. Performances will start at 1:30 daily. Mr. St. Croix is an outstanding roper, one of his special feats being his ability to rope while standing on his head. The first part of the week Christensen Bros. began bringing in the stock for the rodeo. Several of the professional cow boys have been at the grounds for several days. Several out of state boys will be here to participate in the professional events which consist of brahma bull riding, calf roping, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, and bulldogging. Points earned in this rodeo count toward the world's championship.

General admission has been set at one dollar fifty cents which includes the tax. Admission to the bleachers is to be one dollar. Arrangements have been made for several types of concessions including food, soft drinks and novelties. The Rickini Lumber Company has sponsored the Pony Express race for Saturday and C. P. Tillman Company of Eugene is sponsoring the race for Sunday. Clint Spriggs is sponsoring the walk-trot-getoff and run race for Saturday and Sunday. The club appreciates the cooperation of the public in their "going western" for a week and hope as many as possible plan to attend the rodeo both days.

Parade Features Rodeo

A parade will be held Saturday morning at 11:00 o'clock in connection with the rodeo. It will form at the City Park and proceed west on Main Street across the Main Street bridge where it will disband. From there the horses will proceed out South River Road to the Rodeo grounds which are one-half mile south of town on Highway 99. Arrangements have been made for a police escort for the parade. The parade will be led by O. M. Patten, president of the Riding Club, followed by the executive committee of the club. Next will be Queen Doreen (Doreen Lyons, Cottage Grove) with her court, princess Rose Malone, Creswell, Princess Janice Billings, Eugene, and princess Clara Barrett, Lowell. Also in the parade will be the Regatta princesses, Patty Lee Rickard, LaVaughn Stokes, Betty Duerst, Liane Morelock and Ada Carter in the boat which is the grand prize to be given at the Regatta held on August 6-7-8.
