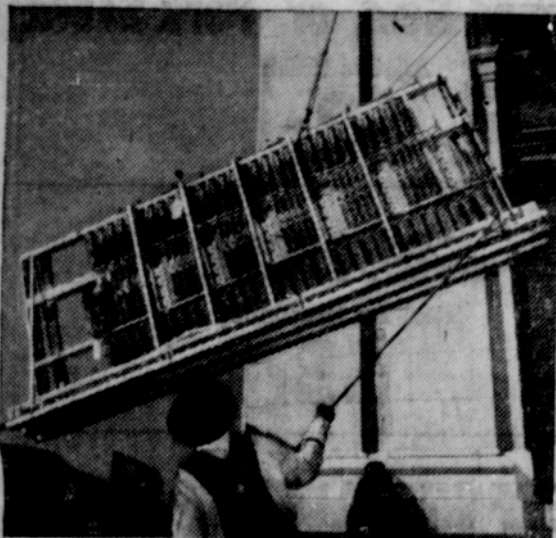

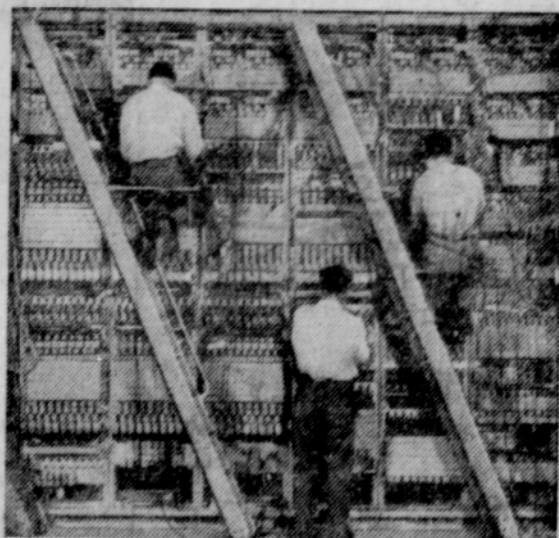

Sweden led in production of matches for many years, but the United States now tops this field. Sweden now ranks fourth in production, Great Britain second and the Soviet Union third.

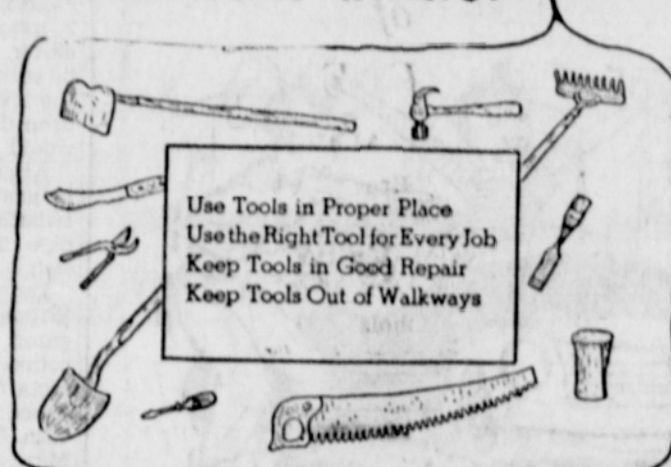
Freight Locomotives
