**THREE SUCCESSFUL EVENTS**

That this section can do things in a successful way has been amply demonstrated in the past year or two. Congratulations are therefore in order for the Cottage Grove Riding club, the Junior Chamber of Commerce and R. S. Drenner, altho the latter is sponsored by the Jaycees and the pageant, which is the brain child of Mr. Drenner are the two events to look forward to, past years have demonstrated their success.

We might say, however, the three successful projects are yet in the experimental stage and whether or not they become more or less permanent will depend in a large measure on how they are operated; more on how the sponsoring organizations cooperate. To have worthwhile enterprises of this sort blossom for a time and then die would be nothing short of tragedy and therefore we feel the urge to give a bit of free advice based on the comments we have heard during the past few weeks.

Rodeos are common and nearly every cross roads community puts them on, but it seems that the Cottage Grove Riding club has what it takes to present a successful rodeo which the public supports. This organization is to be especially congratulated on the fact that they have just finished their first professional event, has secured grounds and has made a good start toward a substantial building program. Its future success will of course depend primarily on the Cottage Riding club.

Like the Bend water pageant, R. S. Drenner is offering something unique in the annual pageant, a show that is not seen anywhere else in the United States so far as we know. This should make it an outstanding attraction if, and the big "if" is if Drenner can get the public support and the support of the Rod and Gun club. He has stated that this will be his last year to spend about sixty days of his own time in building the pageant paraphernalia and in trying to get a cast together. Mr. Drenner only recently told a Sentinel reporter that he would be glad to direct the event, but felt it was too much of a sacrifice to try and run the whole show.

And in connection with any community event such as the three mentioned above, the common complaint has been that the hard work has been left up to a few individuals. The Junior Chamber of Commerce is having the same trouble, only a few respond when the call is sent out for volunteers.

The three events have demonstrated one thing, that the community can accomplish enterprises of which all can be proud. The only logical thing to do is to roll up our sleeves and help.

**WE BREAK RECORDS**

There are a good many records falling by the wayside it seems. The most notorious possibly is Oregon's and the nation's gasoline consumption. The story about the gasoline consumption in the state could be told about practically every place in the nation. The fact that we are consuming gasoline at an alarming rate isn't so alarming to most of us as the fact that we have stepped up the hazards of car driving with excess speed a great deal more than we have stepped up safety devices for the passengers in the cars as well as the pedestrians.

With more driving and a greater speed we need more and not less of devices designed to make for safety. We believe there should be more and not less need for driving sanely in the congested traffic zones and on narrow streets. There is no doubt that should we feel we can afford the services of a traffic expert that we would have more one way streets, instead of fewer, more safety for the area immediately surrounding our schools, now that schools will soon be underway again, more stop streets and in quite a few instances a street widening campaign.
