Potash for Soybeans
With the increased demand for soybeans, as a source of edible vegetable oil (and as a protein concentrate for livestock feed, has risen the importance of increased yields of soybeans through good stands of adapted varieties and proper fertilization. As a rule, little fertilizer or lime is used on soybeans or on the crops in rotation with soybeans. However, potash and phosphorus are required just like cotton, corn, tobacco or any other crop.
