O. & C. Land Open To Mining Lately

Secretary of the Interior, J. A. Krug, today announced his approval of new regulations of the Department of the Interior for the exploration and development of mineral deposits in more than two and one-half million acres of public land in western Oregon. The new regulations are based on the provisions of public law 477 passed by Congress in the last session.

Between 1937 and the enactment of Public Law 477, no authority existed for carrying on mineral development work on these "O and C" lands. However, some mining claims were located in the area during that period and were validated by the new enactment, which also provided for the future development of the mineral deposits in the area under the Federal Mining Laws.

Under the new regulations, which will be administered by the Bureau of Land Management in the Department, a notice of the location of mining claims on the "O and C" lands must be filed in the Bureau's Land and Survey office at Portland, as well as in the County Recording Office if the state law requires. Notice of claims established after the 1937 act but before April 8, 1948, must be filed in that office by October 5, and notice of claims located or before April 8, must be filed within 60 days after the location is made. The location notice must contain the name and address of the locator of the claim.

LEWIS & CLARK TO GIVE SCHOLARSHIP

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE, Portland, Oregon, Aug.—Gifts totaling \$8742 from the Annie Roberts foundation to be used for scholarships for outstanding graduates of Oregon high schools has been received by Lewis and Clark college, President Morgan S. Odell has announced.

Established in 1946 according to the will of the late Thomas Roberts, one of the founders of Roberts Brothers department store, in honor of his wife, Annie Roberts, the foundation was organized to provide funds for scholarships to 12 Oregon colleges and universities to worthy and deserving students who have shown exceptional academic excellence.

Lewis and Clark will use only the income from its gifts for annual awards to be known as the Annie Roberts Memorial scholarships to outstanding graduates of Oregon high schools, Dr. Odell said.

Navy Enlistments Again Open For Young Men

The local Navy Recruiting Office located in the basement of the Post Office Building at Eugene, Oregon, announces that they are now accepting applications for enlistment in the U. S. Navy. Enlistments, which were closed during July, are open for a limited amount of young men each month, and Chief L. J. Reinholdt advised all young men who are interested in enlisting in the U. S. Navy in the near future to come to the local Navy Recruiting Office and fill out their applications so that they may be placed on the waiting list. He also announces that many Navy trade schools are still open, and young high school graduates may choose their school before enlisting.

Bean, Hop, Mint Harvest Attracts Number Laborers

The current bean, hop and mint harvest which will get well underway by the middle of the month is expected to attract several hundred laborers into Lane county

fields, but for the first year since the war, no pickers will be transported out of here so far as known.

Formerly bean growers supplied most of the transportation, but if they contemplate such a move this year, the fact has not been announced. Pickers, however, will be needed when the beans in

the Russum yard and possibly other yards are ready to be harvested. Estimates in Eugene say that fully 8,500 laborers will be needed in the county fields when bean and hop picking gets really underway.

The current bean price announced is 2 1/2 cents per lb. with a quarter cent bonus for the late stayers. Wages in the hop fields have not

been set yet, but it is understood that hop growers around Salem are paying 4 to 5 cents per pound.

FLAKY CRUST FRUIT PIE

PASTRY
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 tsp. salt
3 to 4 tbsp. ice water

FILLING
2 1/2 cups fruit
1 cup sugar (about)
2 tbsp. flour
1 tbsp. butter

Get shortening into flour and dry ingredients. Add only sufficient water to make dough stick together in a single piece. Divide into two parts. Roll out one part, top and bottom of pie. Roll out the other part, sides of pie. Seal with water, cover with dough rolled and slit for the top. Bake with preheat oven to 375°. Bake with control set to 425° for 40 minutes.

COOL SUMMER DESSERT

CHOCOLATE LIME SWIRL

25 to 30 chocolate cookies
3 tbsp. butter, melted
1 pkg. lime gelatin dessert
1/2 cup hot water

1/2 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar
1 half can Cornstarch Milk chilled
1 tsp. grated lemon rind
4 drops green food coloring

Butter a 10" spring-form pan. Line sides with 12 or more cookies. Crush remaining cookies, mix with butter, and place on bottom of pan, saving some for topping. Dissolve gelatin dessert in hot water. Add lemon juice and sugar. Let stand while whipping Cornstarch Milk to a stiff froth. Add gelatin dessert to whipped Cornstarch Milk and continue whipping till stiff peak is formed. Mix in lemon rind and food coloring. Pour over the cookie crumbs. Make swirl on top by outlining a large "C" with a spoon. Pour remaining crumbs over the "C". Chill about 4 hours or till firm. Serves 6 to 12.
