Outlook Dim For Nitrogen Needed For Fertilizers

There's now hope for an increase of about 10 percent in the stock of nitrogen in the United States next year but the chance of any of the additional supply showing up in increased supplies of nitrogen fertilizer here in Oregon is considered slim.

Distribution of the ammonia for nitrogen fertilizer manufacture rest in the hands of the fertilizer industry and current no domestic maker of nitrogen is operating in the northwest, states Arthur S. King, O. S. C. extension soils specialist. This means, explains King, that additional supplies of nitrogen fertilizer will be available here only if it cannot be sold closer to manufacturing centers.

Chances for this are considered remote since the nitrogen shortage is nationwide.

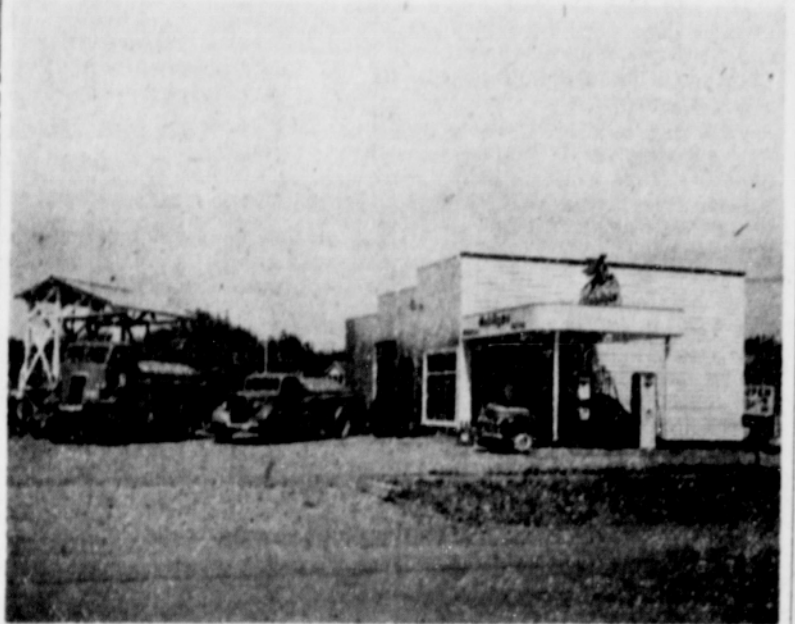
Nitrogen fertilizer supply here is dependent upon whether or not the Columbia Metals plant in Salem can resume operations. It has now been closed since February. This plant has been the major source of nitrogen fertilizer in the northwest for the past three years.

The plant is now closed as a result of its inability to secure anhydrous ammonia, a necessary raw material in the manufacture of ammonium sulfate. There is some possibility that the plant will be able to resume operations with ammonia released from army production King explains.

Recently, the Production and Marketing administration of the U. S. department of agriculture announced that farms in the United States would have available 10 per cent more nitrogen this coming year. The increase is expected to come from stepped up imports from Chile and Canada, slightly increased domestic production, and diversion of material produced in army operated plants for use in the occupied areas of Germany and Japan.

Use of nitrogen this past year in this country reached the total of 817,000 tons, the equivalent of over four million tons of ammon-

ium sulfate. This was the greatest quantity of fertilizer ever used in this country, King points out. Still, it did not meet demands and the 10 per cent increase for next year will again fall short of expected requirements, King predicts.

RECOMMEND TRANSLATION OF WORLD'S GREAT BOOKS

PARIS — Looking forward to creating a better understanding among peoples by making available to them the world's classics, a group of 11 experts meeting here have made recommendations for translation of the world's great books through the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

The project, requested by the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations will be drawn up in three categories: recognized classics written before 1901, modern classics up to 1939 and contemporary great books. The panel of experts proposed that all countries should establish National Committees to centralize and coordinate the work, preparing lists of the works of their own authors whose works should be widely translated.

C. V. Lomax has recently opened a new oil, gas and lubrication distribution center with a completely equipped wholesale and retail outlet. The new plant is located on the south highway just east of the south city limit.

In addition to the usual line of accessories carried by an oil bulk plant, this station carries a full stock of white gas of which there is quite a demand. Featured also is Mobil oil outboard, very popular with the fishermen and outboard motor operators.

Mr. Lomax believes that he has the first diesel pump to be installed in a service station. This pump will be used to serve diesel customers along with two pumps to serve the motorists and truckers.

The new plant consists of a building 36 by 48 feet, 40,000 gallons of storage in which there is stored two kinds of gasoline, two kinds of diesel, heating and automotive, and stove oil. The territory served by the distributing center includes the country south to Rice Hill, west to Elkton, east to Diston and north to Creswell. Mr. Lomax opened the General Petroleum bulk plant here about a year ago. Previously this territory was served out of Eugene. Associated with Mr. Lomax is Ray Denham as assistant.

New Winners in United Nations Essay Contest

LAKE SUCCESS, New York—Six additional winners of the international essay competition organized under the auspices of the U. N. Associations or Information Centers, will receive transportation from their homes to Lake Success, plus an allowance of ten dollars per day for thirty days during their period of studies at U. N. Headquarters.

The first three winners previously announced are nationals of Norway, Brazil and India.

Special awards were made to Valentin Chu of Shanghai, China; Ove Pedersen of Swinlinge, Denmark and J. F. Heilker of Schiedam, The Netherlands.

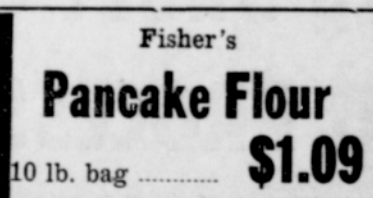
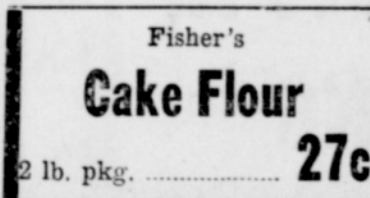

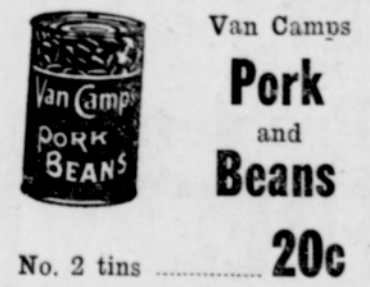
