Convicts Aid Science

Veterans who contracted malaria while fighting in tropical jungles will gain help from the human guinea pigs in Joliet, Ill., prison who offered their bodies for research. A new drug, pentamidine, was tested on the convicts. It proved effective and now is being distributed free by the Illinois veterans commission service. Authorities claim it will be of value in 95 per cent of all cases of relapsing malaria.

Indian Cattle Raisers

Indians have increased their beef cattle herds from 171,000 in 1932 to 383,300 in 1946, and meantime the quality of the cattle has improved greatly. Dairy cattle, likewise, increased from 11,000 to 30,000 in the same period. Income from livestock operations during these years grew from \$1,300,000 to more than \$21,000,000.

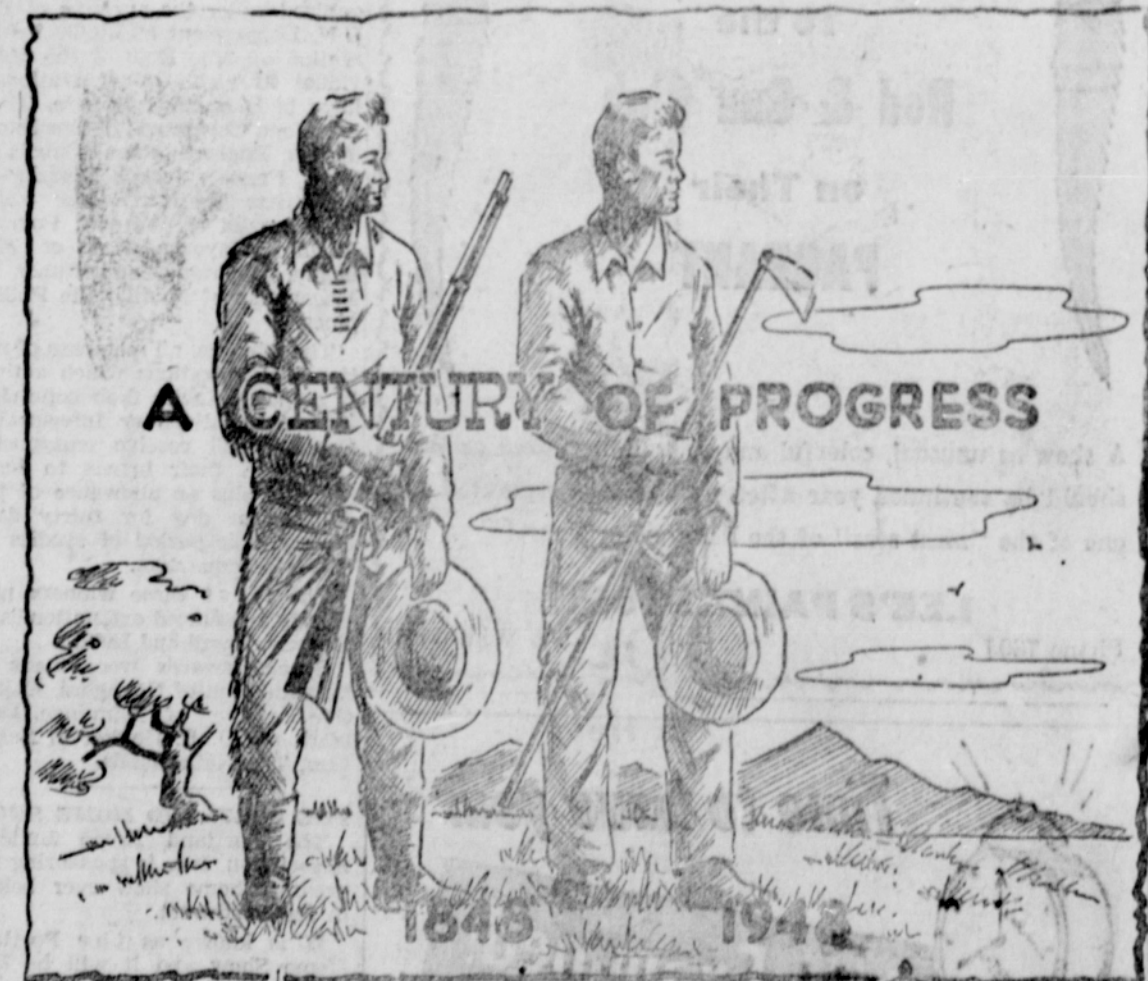
