Mr. and Mrs. Jay Blackmore, who have been visiting in Iowa and Minnesota the past two months, have returned home.

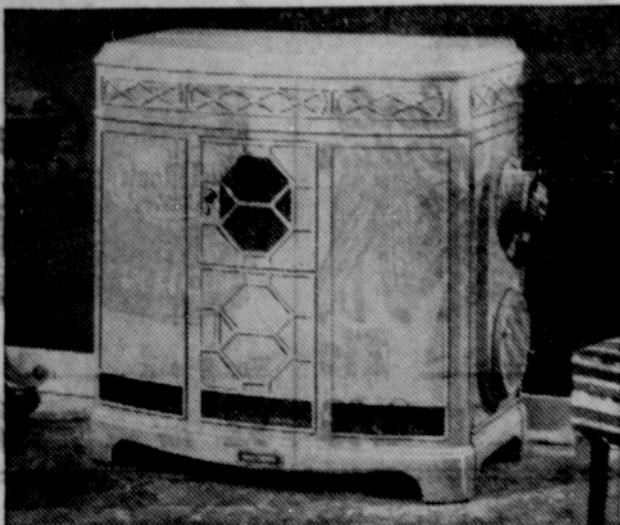

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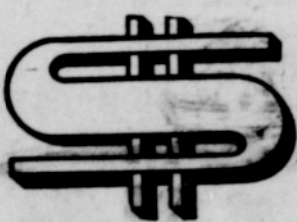
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
