

Summer Driving Made Hazardous By Higher Speeds

Drivers who think summer road and weather conditions make it safe to speed up are working on a theory not born out by the facts, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry warns.

"Summer driving is less hazardous than winter driving, of course," Newberry said. "But what motorists tend to forget is the increased chance of death in any accident, due to higher speeds and heavier traffic."

The secretary blames much of the state's recent large death toll on high speeds induced by good roads and weather. In a survey of accident figures, he points out that the chance of death in any accident is more than twice as great in clear weather as in rain.

Similarly, the chance for death is greater on a dry highway than on wet, snowy, or icy roads.

"A moment's thought will show that this apparently unusual experience is due to slower driving speeds under the adverse conditions," Newberry declared. "The chance for death drops as speed drops. If we gave heavy traffic the same consideration as a driving hazard we give to rain or snow, our summer fatality rate would be cut in half."

Methodist Church Over Half Complete; Intensive Financial Crusade Now On

The new First Methodist Church on Washington avenue will be one of Cottage Grove's most modern and attractive public buildings.

Construction was required by the request of the city that the old church at the head of Main street be vacated as early as possible.

Immediate action was taken to comply with this order but not without grave concern and hardship upon the members of this community service organization.

Rev. Frank Brown has taken the lead in this project and has succeeded in erecting the foundation and framework at a cost of about \$40,000. The sum of \$24,000 is needed at once to meet present costs and an additional \$26,000 is needed for further construction.

A canvass of the community for the sum of \$50,000 is now under way under the direction of Dr. John Henry Soltman of the Methodist Board of Church Extension of Philadelphia. He is employed by this board and has had valuable experience in financing public buildings of this type.

WALKER UNION CHURCH PRESENTED BIBLE

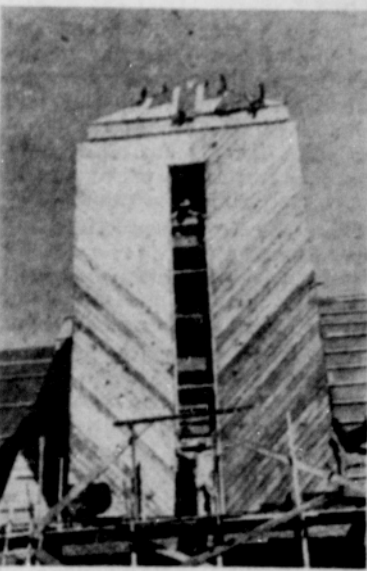
Members and friends of the "Little White Church on the Hillside" were honored and exceedingly pleased with the gift of a Bible. WCTU Children's Home in 25th Year

Corvallis, Aug. 17 — The Oregon W.C.T.U. Children's Farm Home, near here, will observe its 25th anniversary, Sunday, August 22, with a picnic on the campus lawn at 1 p.m. followed by a program.

If August, 1923, the farm dedicated its first two cottages, each with facilities for 20 children, and laid the cornerstone for a third cottage. Now it has eight cottages with sleeping accommodations for 165 children and an adult staff of 23; and also a superintendent's residence, office building, health cottage, utility house and barns for cows, pigs, chickens and farm equipment.

During the 25 years, the Home has cared for 1200 children. Many organizations and individuals throughout the state take regular interest in the Home through contributions of shoes, clothing, food, furniture and needed household and farm equipment. Cash gifts have permitted the creation of a \$200,000 endowment fund in addition to the \$400,000 investment in building, farm machinery, livestock and other needed equipment.

William B. Schnebly is superintendent of the Home; C. L. Starr of Portland, chairman of the board of trustees; and Mrs. Ruth E. Toozie, Oregon W.C.T.U. president.

The anniversary program will include entertainment by the children and displays of some of their handiwork, an address by Marshall N. Dana, editor of the editorial page of the Oregon Journal, and an inspection trip over the 285-acre farm.

A large turnout is expected, as every W.C.T.U. local in the state is planning to send at least one carload of its members to the celebration. The next building improvement planned for the campus is the erection of a chapel.

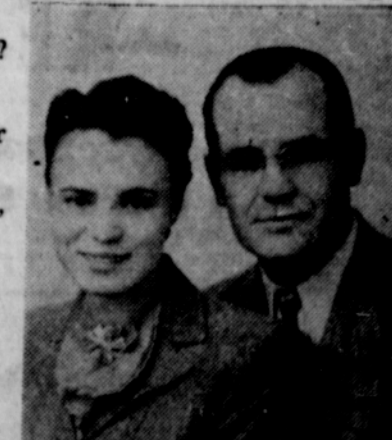


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
