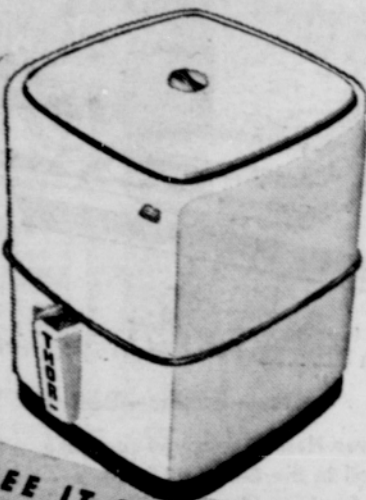

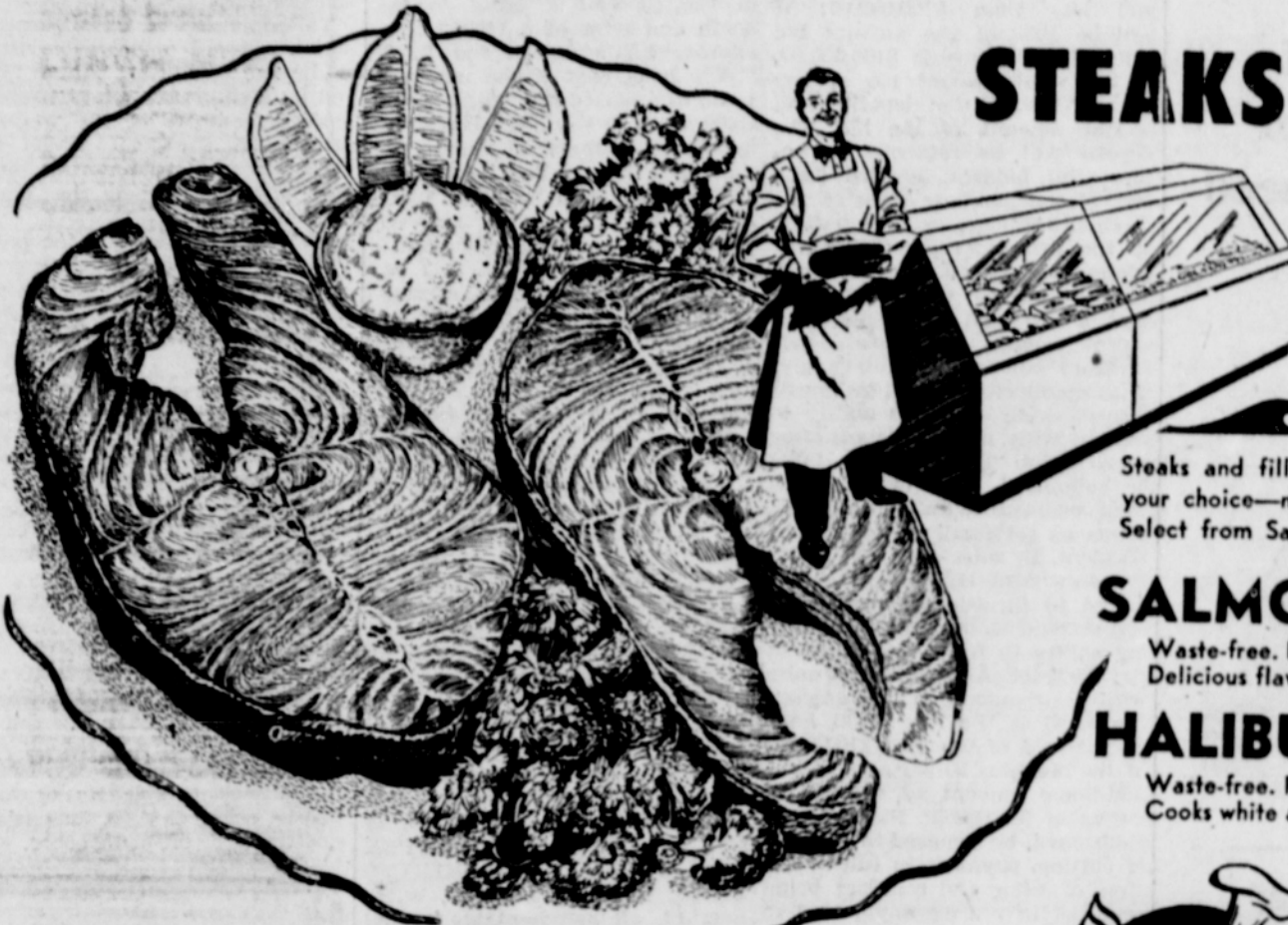

FRIED FILLETS

Cut slightly-thawed frozen fish in serving-size pieces; salt and let stand until salt is absorbed, about 10 minutes. Dip in milk; roll in bread crumbs. Fry in melted shortening at moderate heat until well-browned.

BAKED FILLETS WITH TOMATO

Place 1½ pounds frozen fish in shallow baking pan. Cover with a mixture of ¼ cup melted shortening, ¼ tsp. garlic salt, ¼ cup chopped parsley. Slice 2 medium-size tomatoes over fish, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F.) for 20 minutes.

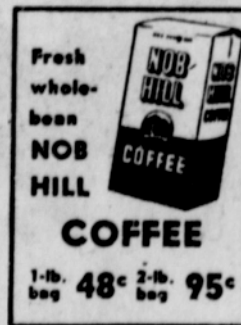
