Goal of \$24,000 Reached by Teams Methodist Church

The \$24,000 Building Fund goal of the Methodist church was over-subscribed after seven days of solicitation by church teams. The enthusiastic workers are now continuing the campaign for additional funds needed to complete the project.

Dr. John Henry Soltman of the Methodist Board of Church Extension of Philadelphia was delighted over the willing response to the appeal for funds and has high commendation for the community in its determination to provide adequate church facilities for Cottage Grove.

"This building is a fine addition to this bustling city," says Dr. Soltman. "Real consideration has been given to the social and religious needs of young people. Church buildings should measure up to the high standards set by our modern high schools. The contrast between school buildings and churches has often reflected sadly upon the latter. Out of date, shabby, and poorly equipped churches have little to induce church attendance on the part of young people."

"The New First Methodist church has an educational plant that is modern in every detail. It has rooms for all departments of its present school and is prepared to take care of the rapidly growing population on the west coast. The plan of the building shows real foresight and neither dimensions nor costs are extravagant," says Mr. Soltman.

The present investment in the building is \$65,000 and it is estimated that the finished cost will be in the neighborhood of \$95,000. Dr. Soltman says that the building when completed will be worth at least \$150,000, revealing the economy that has been employed in construction as well as many man hours of donated labor.

The laying of bricks around the tower is almost completed. The sanctuary has been plastered and is almost ready for occupancy. Three departmental rooms for beginners, primaries and juniors, located on the ground floor, are also near completion. The edifice is of Gothic architecture and red brick with cathedral windows. The frame work consists of laminated arches set inside of cloistered aisles.

Modern equipment is being installed throughout including oil heat, air conditioning, light-weight exploded volcanic glass plaster, rock lath and recessed nave lighting. Concern for youth welfare is shown by conveniences such as the ramp entrances for little children who will occupy the light, well ventilated ground floor rooms.

Included in the structure are combination dining room, drama room and public auditorium for groups of 200 or less. The Sanctuary will seat about 300 and provision is made for a choir of 25. The kitchen next to the dining room will be modern. A well equipped nursery room will provide for the care of infants while parents are in the worship service. The church parlor and the Youth Fellowship room will have fireplaces, and a kitchenette will serve small group meetings.

The pastor's study will be in the front of the church, easily accessible to persons passing the building. The attractive wedding chapel is also adequate for groups of 40 or less. The campaign for funds has met with a ready response from non-members as well as members of the church and the general sentiment is one of approval of the project.
