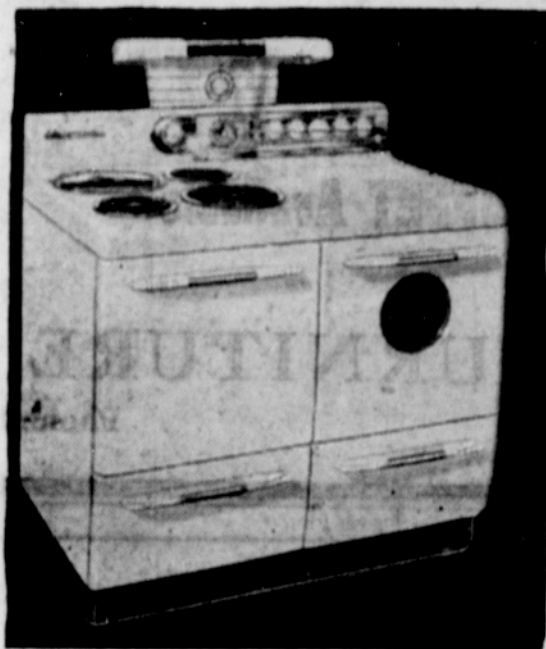

Important to Give Correct Social Security Number

Recent studies by the Social Security Administration show that a considerable number of wage earners are using a social security account number different from the one originally issued to them. Paul F. Johnson, manager of the Eugene office, stated today. This is particularly true of individuals who change their jobs often. Many persons when going to work for an employer give their social security number from memory or from some personal records. According to Johnson, such practices often result in an incorrect social security account number being reported to the Administration. Employers should insist upon seeing a new employee's social security card at the time he is hired. If he does not have a card, he should be requested to obtain one immediately.

Women wage earners who have changed their names because of marriage should ask the Social Security Administration to change their social security cards to show their new names. Failure to do so has resulted in employers reporting wages for women under a marriage name which is not shown in Administration records. This causes considerable difficulty in crediting wages to an individual's old-age and survivors insurance account.

Johnson set forth this rule for employers to follow: "Report wages only under the name and number shown on a person's social security card. Insist upon seeing the social security card."

Wage earners desiring to check the accuracy of their old-age and survivors insurance account may do so by calling at or writing to the local office of the Social Security Administration, Post Office Building, Eugene, Oregon.

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 p.m., Sept. 7, 1948, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 20 acres within Sections 8, 9, 15, 16, 22 and 23, T. 22S., R. 1 E., W.M., Umpqua National Forest, estimated to be 500,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, and an unestimated amount of other species of saw timber. No bid of less than \$3.15 per M feet for Douglas-fir and \$1.00 per M feet for other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a co-operative deposit of \$0.40 per M feet B.M., to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$500.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. 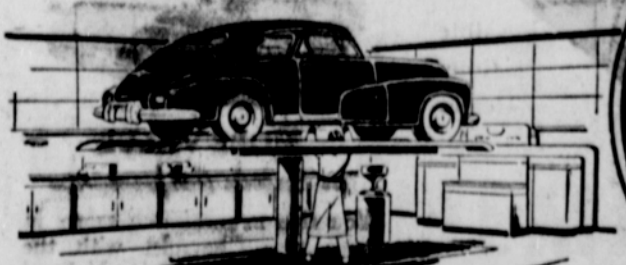
