Lions Wallop Sweet Home

The Cottage Grove Lions overpowered Sweet Home's Huskies Friday night, on the Sweet Home field, with a score of 28-6, during an inter-county league game.

Cottage Grove received the opening kickoff and ran for three successive first downs. The Lions were then on the 9 yard line but fumbled the ball and Sweet Home recovered on their own 23. The Lions held four downs when the center's pass went over the kicker's head on fourth down. It took just three plays for the Lions to score. The last play was an 11 yard end run by Rollo Bush.

The first Grove score came on a pass and the second on one of Sweet Home's passes. Larry Anderson, Lions' back, intercepted the Huskies' pass on their own 40 yard line, and went all the way to score.

Sweet Home scored midway through the second period on a long drive from deep in their own territory. An 18 yard pass "play" climaxed the drive.

Cottage Grove's final score came early in the third period on a pass play after the Lions had been held for downs on the Sweet Home 2. The Huskies kicked out to their own 23. In two plays the Lions were back on the Sweet Home 2. From here they were penalized five yards for offside, and then 15 yards for tripping. This set the stage for the final score.

Grove reserve played most of the remainder of the game, and neither team was able to score.

A city chap was crossing a pasture. "Hi, there," he called to the farmer, "is this bull safe?"

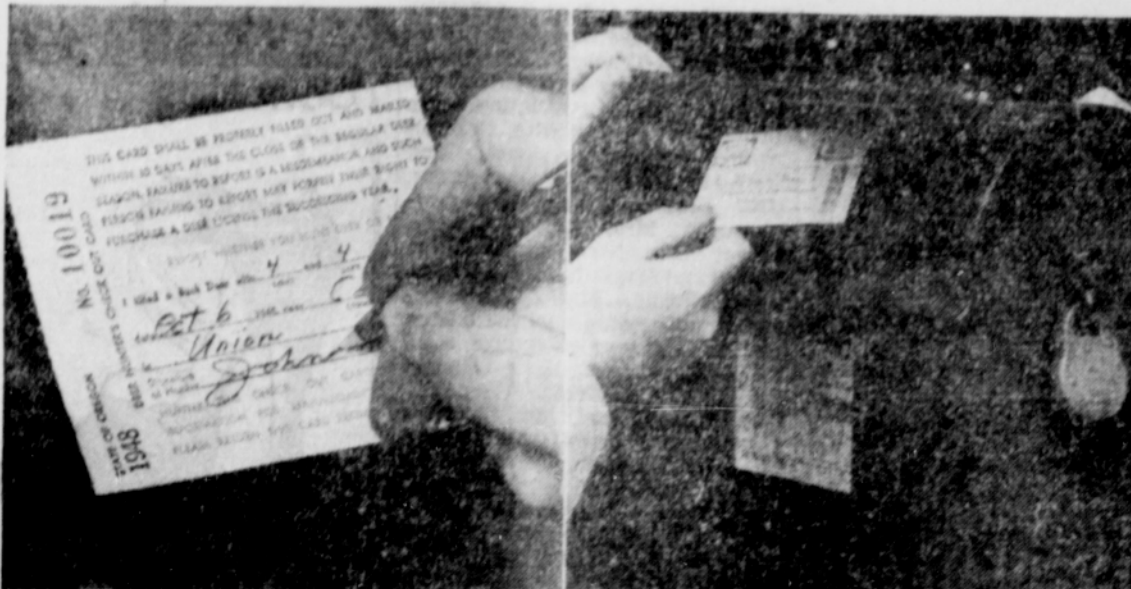
"He's a lot safer than you are," was the reply.

OREGON DEER HUNTERS TO REPORT SUCCESS

All deer hunters are to fill out these cards and drop them in a mail box. The cards are self addressed and require no postage to be paid by the hunter.

For the first time Oregon deer hunters will be asked to contribute vital information concerning the deer of the state. The 1948 deer hunting season marks this important change for Oregon hunters. A separate deer tag, comparable to the separate elk tags that have been issued for several years, is being issued for the first time in Oregon.

Each deer hunter must obtain a special deer tag before going hunt-

ing and attached to this tag is a self addressed information card which must be mailed to the Game Commission within thirty days after the close of the deer season. Only a few seconds are necessary on the part of the hunter to complete the card. The facts which will be provided by these return cards are considered to be essential in deer management, and conscientious efforts on the part of all sportsmen will enable the Game

Commission to plan for the permanency of deer hunting in Oregon. The success of the system as previously applied to elk hunting bears out the importance of this information. It is expected that excellent cooperation will be extended by all sportsmen in providing these necessary facts.

The law requires all purchasers of deer tags to return these cards whether successful in bagging a buck or not.

Ducks Will Find Michigan Tough

University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 28. The University of Oregon Ducks expect to find their toughest opposition of the 1948 season October 2 when they meet Michigan's Rose Bowl champions.

It will be the first time teams from the two schools have met, and both are undefeated for this young season. Michigan opened its 1948 campaign with a 13 to 7 victory over Michigan State in a traditional rivalry and the Ducks are riding the crest of an eight-game winning streak. Oregon won its last six games in 1947 and has beaten Santa Barbara and Stanford in the opening games this year.

The Ducks looked sluggish as they squeaked past Stanford, and Coach Jim Aiken is working the team long and hard this week in preparation for the Wolverine game. The Ducks will scrimmage at least twice and two days will be devoted to finesse in dummy scrimmage.

The Oregon - Michigan affair rates as one of the top games of the week and an important game for the entire Pacific Coast Conference. The Wolverines trounced Southern California, 49 to 0, in the last Rose Bowl game and the Ducks are being counted on to gain back some degree of prestige for the coast conference.

Coach Aiken is worried about the Oregon line, which nearly collapsed against the Indians. However, if the Webfoot forward wall shapes up before the game at Ann Arbor, the Oregon coach believes his team will make a very creditable showing for the Pacific Coast.

The Ducks escaped the Stanford game without serious injuries and will be at full strength for Michigan. Woodley Lewis, who was held out of action during most of the Stanford game with a slight elbow injury, should be ready to share the left halfback spot with Johnny McKay, Oregon's leading ground gainer for two games.

The Oregon team will fly to Ann Arbor today and return to Eugene by air Sunday morning.

OSC Coach Praised In Oct. 2 Post

"We don't want anybody who doesn't want Oregon State," says Lon Stiner, Oregon State College football coach, in an article by Al Stump in the (Oct. 2) Saturday Evening Post. As proof, on Stiner's 1946 squad, which placed second in the Conference, twenty of the first twenty-six players were Oregon boys, and all twenty-six had arrived on the campus unsubsidized.

"The only Purdy Code violation of which Oregon State was pronounced guilty of in 1947, consisted of giving its players \$1 too much in travel allowances for a trip to Berkeley," says Mr. Stump.

Hailed as a sort of football Galahad—the pure knight in the land of subsidized dragons—Stiner has the best round-robin mark in the Coast Conference heading into the 1947 season—a matter of 31 league wins, 17 losses and four ties. "This may not be the greatest record in football, but Stiner admirers feel it is a convincing refutation of the theory that you can't compete without a player dragnet," according to Mr. Stump's Post article.

Judging a coach's record over a long period of years rather than on one or two gaudy seasons, Stiner comes up a top hand, during his 16 years at Oregon State. As one observer pointed out, "Stiner isn't just the holiest man in the racket out here, he's also the rock of ages. Maybe the second is a reward for the first."

The first run of silvers has started up the Umpqua. Catches have been reported from Elkton on down. Several good catches have been taken at the big bend just below Gardiner. The most frequently used lure is a hammered brass and nickel spoon with a red feathered tri-hook.

Ivan Patton has gone well this past week at brandy bar near Scottsburg. He has caught several good sized silvers.

Joan Kuehn and Orlena Martin went out on the Sharon L. at Winchester bay this past week end. Some time was spent out over the bar, but the water became so rough the boat was forced back into the bay. Forest Camps In Oregon

More than 250 forest camps are operated in Oregon by the United States forest service. Additional camps are maintained at Crater Lake national park. Oregon territorial centennial visitors in 1948 are invited to use them without fee, with the exception of Crater Lake where a park entrance charge is made, according to the Oregon state highway commission travel information department.

Friday, October 1, thousands of Oregon nimrods will take to the forests as the general deer season opens. Although general rains throughout the state should make ideal hunting conditions, hunters should be extremely careful with fires as the deep forest is still dry in many parts of the state.

Although many hunters will as usual hunt for mule deer in the eastern part of the state, it is expected that more than the usual number will hunt blacktail deer this season. This will be due, in part, to the opening of the majority of the Tillamook burn area to hunting this year. The deer in this region are reported to be in excellent condition.

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor, once again calls attention to the fact that this year all deer hunters are required to obtain a deer tag before hunting. This tag is in addition to the regular hunting license and can be obtained at any license agency or at the Portland offices of the Oregon State Game Commission.
