

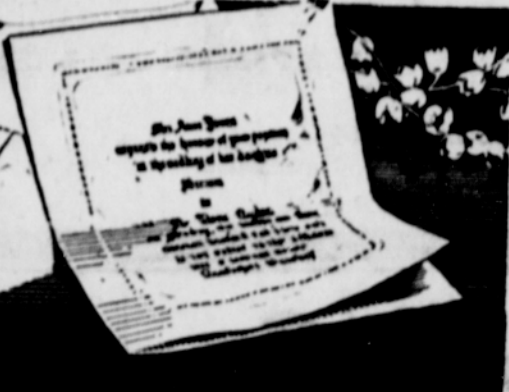
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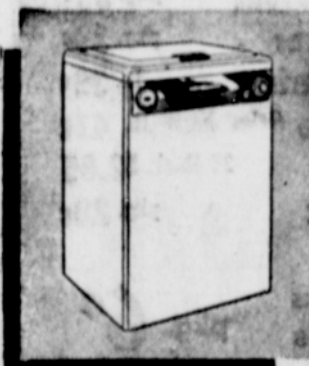
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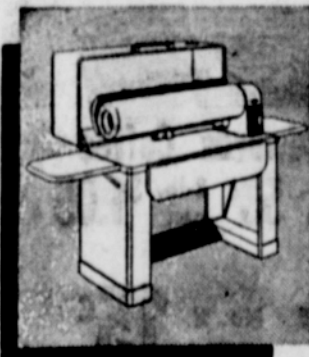

High School Press Conference Set for November 5-6

U. of O., Eugene—Plans for the 22nd annual Oregon High School Press conference were announced recently by the University of Oregon school of journalism, sponsors of the conference. November 5 and 6 are the dates scheduled for the meetings of the prep newspaper workers.

Invitations for the two-day affair have been mailed to delegates from every high school in the state, according to Warren C. Price, associate professor of journalism, who is in charge of arrangements. The conference this year has been scheduled for November, a month earlier than usual, so that high school journalists will be better able to make full use of new techniques learned at the conference.

FFA MAKES GOOD SHOWING AT FAIRS

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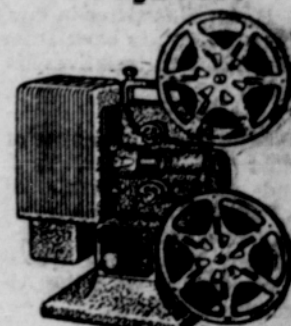
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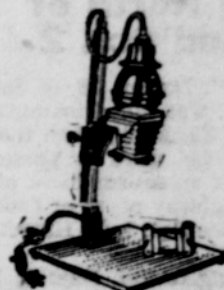
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
