California Man Is Killed North of Oakland Oct. 2

James W. Donley, 38, of Sausalito, Calif., was killed instantly at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, when the car in which he was a passenger plunged off an embankment of the Pacific Highway north of Oakland. State Police Sgt. Lyle Harrell reported.

According to Sgt. Harrell, Donley was riding with Joseph F. Ronne, Marion City, Calif., who told the police the car "went out of control" while traveling at a speed of 45 to 50 miles an hour and hurtled off the left embankment about eight miles north of Oakland. Donley reportedly was asleep in the rear of the car.

Ronne was not seriously injured. After Donley's body had been removed to Stearns Mortuary, Ronne went on to Portland and was scheduled to return to Oakland to accompany the body to Sausalito, reported Coroner Harry C. Stearns. Further information on Donley was not immediately available, said Stearns.—Roseburg News Review.

Mills was also chairman of the group that started the Plummer memorial fund in memory of the late manager of the P. I. L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader and chairman of the Camp Plummer committee, says the scholarships will be continued. One boy and one girl will be chosen annually. Club members from all states competing at the show are eligible, states Walter Holt, show manager.

Floor Sanding

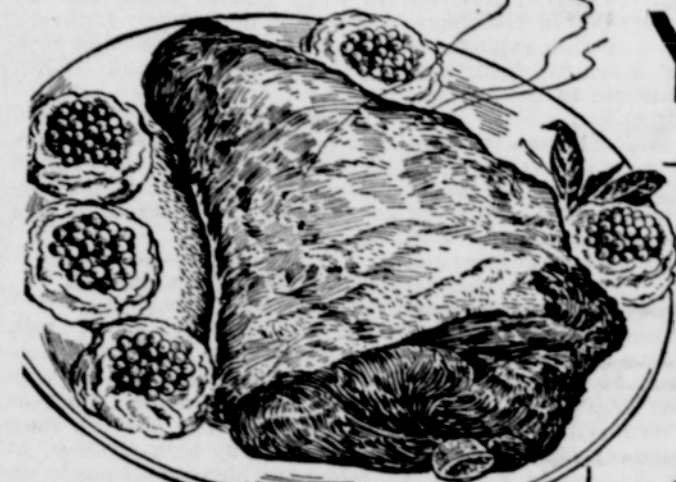

Season with salt and pepper, and a few thin slices of onion over the top. Add 4 to 5 strips of bacon to the top and roast in 300° F. oven for approximately 30 minutes per pound. Serves 6 to 8.

TOMATO POT ROAST

BEEF POT ROASTS PER LB. 59¢

3 to 5 lb. beef chuck
2 tablespoons shortening
1/2 clove of garlic
1 tablespoon salt
2 cups tomato sauce
5 potatoes
5 carrots
Brown meat slowly in shortening. When well browned add tomato sauce, salt and garlic. Cover tightly and simmer until tender, approximately 45 minutes per pound at 300° F. Add vegetables 45 minutes before done. Serves 6 to 8.
