Oregon Tourist Business in 1948 Off 12 Per Cent

SALEM, ORE., Oct. 13 (Special)—Oregon's 1948 tourist business brought estimated revenues of 92 million dollars into the heavier state, the Oregon state highway commission travel information department reported this week.

This figure, 12 per cent below the 1947 estimate of 105 million dollars, is 10 per cent above the 83½ million figure of 1946. The last pre-war travel year of 1941 is credited with a total of 51 million dollars. The 1948 estimate is based on a state highway department traffic check of out-of-state automobiles at 15 major points of entry.

The survey reveals the average expenditure per day per person was \$5.35 as compared to \$5.91 in 1947, which, itself, showed a drop from the 1946 figure of \$6.21. Each out-of-state car represented an expenditure of \$116.65 based on an average load of 3.07 passengers and stays of 7.1 days in Oregon, or equalling \$37.99 per person.

These figures represent motorists as well as those who patronized hotels, auto courts and resorts entirely, offering a thorough cross-section of Oregon vacation travel.

Approximately 600,000 out-of-state automobiles visited Oregon during the year, with average mileage of 663 for each, officials said.

Oregon attracted visitors from every state in the union, with California leading motor travel by 51 per cent because of its proximity and large population. The states of Washington and Illinois were second and third, followed by Nebraska, Idaho, Iowa, and Kansas.

High cost of living and tightening of purse strings are declared pertinent factors in the reduction of individual spending, which reportedly was down in other vacation areas in the nation, indicating a downward trend in general tourist spending.

Good Spots for DDT

When replacing linoleum for kitchen floors, a light dusting of DDT in the cracks of the floor and in an area six inches wide or more near the baseboard will cut down insect infestations, keeping ants and bugs and beetles from making use of the cracks in the floor as an avenue of entry into the house. When carpets are up for cleaning, it's a good idea to dust DDT under them before relaying. Another good place for DDT is under the shields and around the pipes where plumbing comes through the floor or wall.

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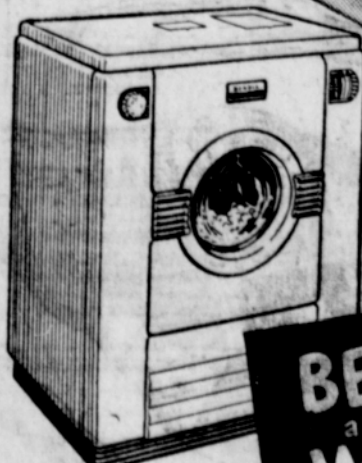
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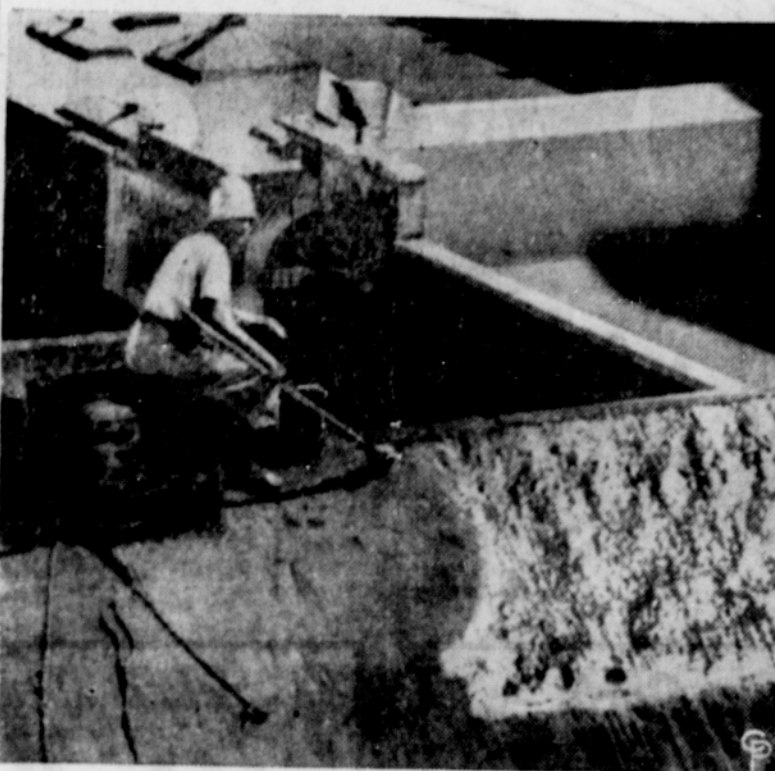
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REPAIRS HER OWN ROOFS AT 77

TODAYS Menu

A Well-Stocked Pantry Shelf

UNEXPECTED company isn't a calamity to the housewife who keeps well-stocked pantry shelves. What with all the wonderful frozen foods, the fine foods in cans and jars, readying a non-scheduled meal is fun. If the main part of the meal is simple, glamorize it in the dessert department. This is always a good idea, for, when recounting a menu, it is generally the dessert that is remembered. "We had a fruit cup soup, some kind of main dish," is the usual sketchy description, but when it comes to describing the dessert, all stops are out.

It is possible to whip up luscious desserts out of staples. You can make a pie that is a treat for any visitor from two pantry staples—a box of cookies and a can of sweetened condensed milk, using chocolate, lemon juice or fresh fruit for flavoring. The pie doesn't need cooking, and it is always a big success, made by a failure-proof recipe that even a new cook can achieve. Incidentally, this is a good recipe for the bride who is starting out her kitchen career from scratch!

Making the Pie

To make the pie, blend 1½ c. (one can) sweetened condensed milk and ¼ c. lemon juice. Stir until mixture thickens. Fold in one c. prepared fruit—fresh raspberries, sliced strawberries, sliced peaches or apricots; or 2 medium-sized ripe bananas, cut in small pieces. Pour into baked pie shell or 9-inch pan lined with cookie crumb crust. Cover with whipped cream: ½ c. whipping cream sweetened with 2 tsp. Serves 6.

Vertical Sun Dials

Sun dials seldom are mounted these days in an upright position. There are, however, many vertical sun dials to be seen on the walls of English and Scottish churches. In America, the most famous vertical sun dial is on the wall of the beautiful Bok singing tower, Lake Wales, Fla.

Covering Wainscoting

"Old fashioned wainscoting in a kitchen can be covered with wall-board for a modernized effect. The wallboard can then be sealed with a coat of shellac or aluminum paint and then finished with one coat of enamel undercoater and one coat of enamel to provide an easily cleaned surface.
