95 Million of Vote Age by November 2

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 — The United States will have about 95,000,000 men and women of voting age by election day, November 2, the census bureau estimated Saturday.

Many of them will be ineligible to vote for various reasons and many who will be eligible won't actually vote. The census bureau made no attempt to predict the vote final, but its data worked out to this:

The vote will be 45,380,000 if ballots are cast at the 1944 (Roosevelt-Dewey) rate, or 46,525,000 if at the heavier 1940 (Roosevelt-Wilkie) rate.

The census bureau said 56.4 per cent of the voting-age civilian population cast ballots in the 1944 race, making the total vote that year 47,967,263.

The comparative percentage for 1940 was 59.5. The total was 49,820,312 votes.

The 95,000,000 estimate for the voting age population on Nov. 2 allowed for a population increase of about 250,000 a month over the bureau's last previous estimate on July 1.

Drivers' Licenses Cards Have Been Recently Improved

A self-contained renewal application and other improvements have been incorporated in Oregon driver's license cards now being issued, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has announced.

Licenses to be used from now on are of better paper stock than was available during the war and are expected to stand up well in wallets and purses, eliminating much of the duplicate license problem. Newbry emphasizes that the new cards will not replace valid licenses now outstanding.

The new permit is folded to the same size as the old single card. The inside of the little folder has become an application blank to be used for renewal by mail. This is the first time such a form has been issued, the secretary said.

He explained that renewal of licenses by mail is a constant source of difficulty because of failure to include full information or correct fee, resulting in heavy correspondence from his office. The self-contained renewal form is expected to eliminate most of this trouble.

Another feature of the new license is a space for recording the holder's blood type, if known,

for emergency use by a doctor in case of accident. The remainder of the card is similar to the old one, with identification, expiration date, and space for recording convictions of major driving violations.

Renewal of old licenses, which expire in blocks of 33,000 each month, is proceeding on schedule, Newbry said. Those numbered from 5R528,001 to 5R561,000 must be renewed in October. By June 1 of next year, all war-time "5R" licenses will have been replaced with permits expiring every two years on the holder's birth date.
