C. G. Lions Defeat Elmira, 38-6

Elmira was the scene of one phase of the Tri County league contest Friday as the roaring Lions trampled the Falcons before they could stretch their wings. The Grovers, undefeated, with four wins and one tie bested Elmira 38-6.

The first touchdown of the game was made in a matter of seconds by the King of Beasts when Harlan Mickey, lanky end for Grovers, intercepted a poor pitchout pass from Wayne Mason on the 27 and ran to make the score.

A fourth down punt was the climax of the Falcon's second series of plays. Mason got the kick off and the ball travelled 4 yards to Elmira's 9 yard line. Bob Summers, the Lions number 1 battering ram, smashed through center for eight yards. Schaffer pulled off a successful quarterback sneak for the second Lion touchdown.

After driving 31 yards to the Falcons second yard line the Grovers made their third tally with Summers driving over the line, at the start of the second quarter. Another poor Elmira punt set up the fourth tally for C. G. in the first half. Jim Weir raised the Lions score by going around the Falcons right end for the fourth tally.

The score stood 24-0 for Cottage Grove at the half.

The most outstanding play of the game can be attributed to Elmira as Tom Brown, Falcon end, trapping Mary Schaffer on a bootleg reverse, stole the ball from the Lions quarterback and dashed 85 yards for Elmira's first score. Center Holcombe threw the key block into Schaffer on the Falcon 20 that enabled Brown to score. The Lions were held scoreless in the third quarter as the Falcons, instilled with new hope, held their ground.

In the last frame Summers bulldozed his way through the Falcons center for 6 yards and another touchdown. Rollo Bush sped around the end for the first conversion point of the game.

Summers kicked off and scooped up an Elmira fumble on his way downfield to set up the final score on Elmira's 40.

Bush and Weir led the attack that brought the Lions down to the Falcons' 17. Bush again took the ball and moved it to the 1 yard line. Schaffer pushed over for the score. The final point of the game was picked up by Bush as he went over for the conversion point.

(Continued from page 2) monthly payments, the city taking a lien against the property as security.

City Park — We have budgeted around \$500.00 each year for several years, yet our park is in worse shape now than in the past. A recent survey of it shows no lights, broken water pipes that have been that way for a long time creating mud holes, rest rooms with the roof leaking, garbage can overflowing with a lot of wet garbage piled on top, septic tank emptying into the park with a lot of rank grass growing at the outlet indicating that the sewage is coming to the surface. Let's clean up the park, move the rest rooms to where they can be connected with the sewer system, install proper lighting, set out a few flowers and shrubs, keep the park green in the summer time and the grass mowed, our own citizens as well as out of state visitors will have a better opinion of us, its upkeep would not be much as the city hall janitor hasn't much to do in the summer time and could look after it, and we could pay him a little more, he is certainly not being overpaid now.

Traffic regulation — We have a growing problem in the regulation of the traffic entering the city as well as within the city. We have neglected in the past to properly estimate the parking problem, and so now find ourselves with no parking lots, the problem is doubly hard now as the vacant property that did exist is now gone but I see no other way but to secure them, for it is time to see at least twice the amount of cars on the streets within the next five years that we have now. People that have to use their cars in order to get to their places of business or to work must have a place to leave them for the day, we have to have parking space other than on the street. At present we have a lot of congestion at the intersection of Main and the Pacific highway, especially between the hours of 5 and 6 in the evening, the Highway department will no doubt solve this problem some time by either relocating the highway where an underpass for east and west traffic can be established, or in some other manner, but until then I believe that an officer should be stationed there when needed to speed up the flow of traffic. It is not uncommon to see two and sometimes three officers on duty during that time, I believe we could spare one of them to help regulate traffic at that point, at least it would give the taxpayer more for his money than being stationed there during the small hours of the night, chasing out of state motorists and street fining them, this practice certainly does not create good will toward us by out of state motorists, let's regulate traffic when and where it needs it but not in that manner. We have a lot of parking meters on our streets and no doubt they help some in the parking problem but lack a long way in solving it, let's be perfectly frank and admit that it is the revenue they bring in that was the selling point in their installation, so it being a business proposition let's look after it in a business manner, let's have a regular routine in checking them. I recently saw a motorist pay for a parking ticket, and at the same time there was five other cars within one block of his car that showed violations but no tickets. Let's go about this in a regular manner so that all cars are checked. This criticism of the present regulation is not directed at any particular officer, but at the wrong, or let us say lack of any regulation.

SPORTSMAN'S REVIEW

Reports of Interest For and About Local Sportsmen By Ray Fuller

I have received several reports on salmon fishing on the Umpqua this week. Some say fishing is a good and others bad. I'll give you the reports and you can make your own decision.

Cliff Smith at the Rainbow Cafe and Al McKenzie fished on the Umpqua around Brandy Bar and Echo Island Tuesday. They came back with three silvers. One 18 pound, one 15 and another small one. They were using a Bear Valley half-and-half spinner with red feathered tri-hooks.

Frank White and Knaffle Haynes fished the Umpqua from Bill's Trout farm to Mill creek Tuesday. White landed a nine pound silver just off Mill creek. They were using No. 5 Vibro-Lite two-tone spinners. They also report that fishing wasn't too good that day.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Short caught four nice silvers between Scottsburg and Brandy Bar this past week end. No report as to lure was received.

The Bush brothers caught four silvers on the Umpqua this past week end. No report as to what part of the river they fished or what lure was used was received.

It looks as if Emery Harris is getting tired of catching these "little" salmon. He had his cabin cruiser, the Sharon L., at Coos Bay the first of this week getting it outfitted with a two-way radio. He is taking it to Monterey, California to do some big game fishing. The Sharon L. is due to leave Coos Bay on its journey south the latter part of this week, weather permitting. Emery says that the group that was fishing from the boat on the way from Winchester Bay to Coos Bay last Sunday caught 17 salmon. They also saw two whales playing near by.

FOURTEEN HUNTERS BRING BACK 14 BUCKS

If you did not get your buck in the deer season which ended yesterday, perhaps you were in the wrong crowd of hunters. Among the most successful hunters were fourteen men, six from Cottage Grove, six from Grants Pass and two members of the game commission or rather game biologists, who spent six days in Larney county. As a summary of all the reports I have received on fishing on the Umpqua, the best fishing is between Scottsburg and Echo Island and from above the big bend below Gardiner on out to Winchester Bay and over the bar. It isn't often, especially this time of year,

that the weather permits small boats out over the bar. Most of the fish caught are caught on a No. 5 or No. 6 two-tone spinner with a red feathered tri-hook. Some fishermen prefer to take a No. 5 spoon and paint the under side of it with red enamel.

Hap Wolfard, Orlo Bagley, Bruce Johnson, Leo "Tex" Rickard and Edgar "Pat" Rickard spent week end before last hunting in the Silver Lake area. Bruce Johnson and Leo Rickard were the only two to bring back deer. Hap says that the only way he could see to get any meat would be to take along your own antlers. All he ever saw was does!

The first of the week Frank Gaidabini started out hunting. He had been hunting for only a short while when he stepped on a twig, the other end came up and punctured his ear drum. It was a bad break for Frank. It ended his hunting for this season.

Red Mills at the marine wharf of the Reedsport Packing Co. sent in the following report:

Fishing has been pretty fair in the lower Umpqua the past week, with most everyone getting a few! Although there has been consistently fair fishing at Winchester Bay and Gardiner, the best catches have been made around Echo resort and Brandy Bar—mostly silver but a few late fall Chinooks. No winter steelhead as yet. Not much doing anywhere else.

THE GILLNETTERS WOULD SNARE YOU WITH THEIR NET OF MONOPOLY!!



MRS. HOUSEWIFE... when one small group gains control of a food product's source can you imagine what might happen to the price of that food product—and to your cost of living? Throwing out a net of high-sounding words about "resources, sports fishing and tourist dollars" the Gillnetters' Union have forgotten to tell you one thing.

The initiative bill for the elimination of fixed gear in the Columbia River gives to the gillnetters 90% of all the catch on the Columbia River — the remaining 10% being caught by the Indians at Celilo.

The Oregon Fish Commission in its June, 1948 report, the Oregon Voter, and Oregon State Planning Board, all say the same thing. Elimination of fixed gear on the Columbia River does not act as a salmon conservation project—but in reality only means that other gear catch more and the gillnets will be all that are left.

What could happen to your food budget under a virtual monopoly? What might happen to salmon prices? You have had experience with other monopolies — what is your answer?

And bear this fact in mind—if the gillnetters did not want to gain absolute control—why would they initiate this monopoly bill? Both the state legislature and the Oregon Fish Commission have the authority to regulate all gear for salmon fishing, if it were necessary.

The bill to "eliminate fixed appliances" is not necessary — it only puts monopolistic control in the hands of a minority group — the gillnetters.
