Drain-Yoncalla Com. Chest Drive To Start Oct. 29

Kick-off for the Douglas County Community Chest at Drain and Yoncalla will be Friday, Oct. 29, it was announced by Benton O. Wilson, campaign chairman.

Community Chest volunteers will meet for a breakfast at Yoncalla under the chairmanship of Mrs. Bernice Mideke, and for a luncheon at Drain with Mrs. J. E. Witzel, to start the local drives to raise a share of the county's \$6,000 goal.

Wilson said that the county's quota includes \$4,000 to be raised for the Oregon Chest agencies, and \$2,000 for the Camp Fire Girls and the Salvation Army which carry on youth programs in the county.

Of the amount to be raised for

the Oregon Chest, Drain and Yoncalla together have been assigned a quota of \$400 in addition to amounts to be raised for the county-wide youth programs.

Other kick-off meetings for the Douglas County Community Chest were held at Reedsport and Gledale Monday, and at Myrtle Creek Wednesday. The Roseburg opening date will be Nov. 2.

Nurse Survey Is Underway in Ore.

The Oregon State Nurses' Association has undertaken to make a state wide study of nursing resources and nursing needs. Assisting in the survey is Miss Edythe Barnes, Washington, D. C., nurse educational consultant, United States Public Health Service.

The demand for nurses the last few years has grown more rapidly than the supply. Advances in medical science, membership in hospitalization plans, expanding public health facilities—these as well as the increasing population and a favorable economic situation explain this increase in demand.

New and expanding health programs, such as those in cancer, tuberculosis and heart disease are bringing more patients to doctors for early diagnosis and treatment. This also creates a greater demand for more nurses.

Intention of the survey is to count every professional nurse, practical nurse, nurses aide and orderly in the state in an effort to determine the extent of the difference between supply of nurses and the demand for nursing service.

A committee representing 35 influential organizations in the state under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Kletzer, executive secretary of the Oregon chapter of the American Cancer society, has been organized to assist in advising the nurse committee in this study.

NOTICE OF TIMBER SALE: Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber", and addressed to the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, Region 1, Bldg. No. 1, Swan Island, Portland 18, Oregon, will be received until and opened at 10:30 A.M., Pacific Standard Time, on November 29, 1948, for the purchase of all merchantable timber designated for cutting upon tracts hereinafter described; the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938, by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, that will be paid for each species, the total consideration which will be paid for the timber and a statement that the bidder will comply with local manufacturing requirements as hereinafter stated. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in cash or in the form of a certified check on a solvent bank and in favor of the Treasurer of the United States. The amount of the deposit will be at least 20% of the first \$1,000.00 of the appraised value of the timber; an additional 10% of the next \$9,000.00; an additional 5% of the amount between \$10,000.00 and \$100,000.00; and an additional 3% of any amount in excess of \$100,000.00. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders upon the award of the bid; applied as part of the purchase price of the successful bidder; or retained as liquidated damages if the successful bidder does not within thirty days of acceptance of the bid execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond and satisfactory evidence of his ability to comply with the local marketing requirement. In sales over \$10,000.00, the successful bidder will be required to furnish a sworn financial statement in duplicate, showing ability to fulfill the financial requirements of the contract. In sales of \$5,000.00 or less, the deposit may be retained as a cash bond, in sales of more than \$5,000.00, surety bonds will be required as follows: more than \$5,000.00, but not more than \$10,000.00, at least 20% of the amount bid; more than \$10,000.00, at least 10% of the amount bid. In sales of \$10,000.00 or less, payment in full will be required prior to execution of the contract. In larger sales payments may be made in installments in accordance with contract payment schedule, dated March 1, 1948. The right is hereby reserved to waive technical defects in the advertisement; to reject all bids, or to award the timber for the amount of the highest bid to the next highest qualified bidder when the officer authorized to approve the contract shall deem the high bidder unqualified to fulfill the contractual requirements of the advertisement. Timber sold in accordance with this advertisement must be manufactured within the marketing area as designated for each tract described below in accordance with the Orders of the Secretary of the

Interior, No. 2285, and Nos. 2380 to 2390, Incl., dated December 11, 1946 and November 29, 1947, respectively. The United States has by agreement been given the right to authorize its purchasers to use certain roads and rights-of-way for the removal of timber. Each bidder should ascertain from the respective District Forester's office the location of the road or right-of-way covered by such agreement relating to the tract

upon which he wishes to bid. It is the bidder's responsibility to determine for himself the extent to which such agreement will permit the use of the road or right-of-way subject to the payment of reasonable compensation to the assignor of the United States. 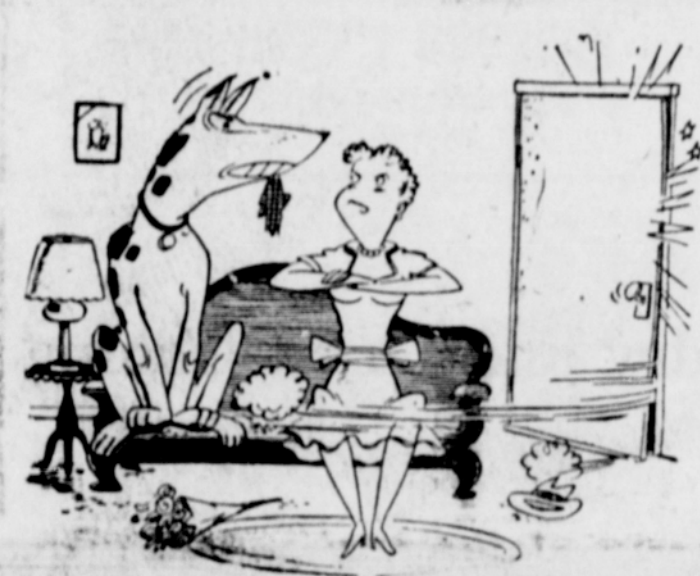

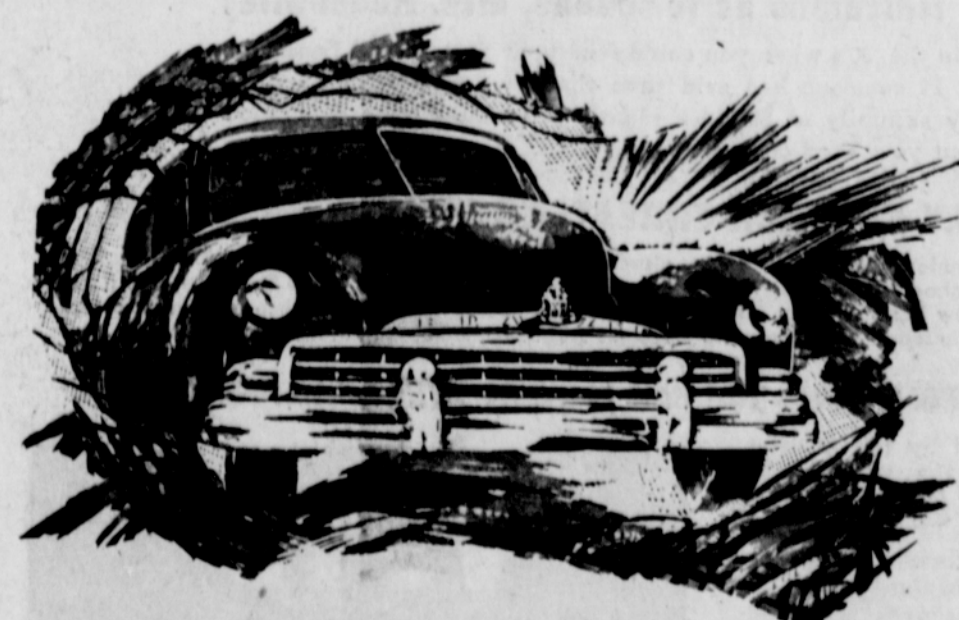
