Lions Tilt Springfield 21 to 6 In Inter-Division Game Friday

The roaring Cottage Grove Lions rolled over the Springfield Millers 21-6 in their last home game of the season Friday night in a hard fought inter-division game.

The Lions warmed up in the first quarter, exchanging kicks and fumbles. The Millers seemed to be holding their own.

In the second quarter it took only three plays for the Lions' first touchdown. From the six yard line little Rollo Bush scampered into paydirt. Schaeffer passed to Mickey for the conversion.

After this touchdown, the Grove team tried new kickoff strategy. Summers kicked the ball easily and a host of Lion players fell on the ball, making it the Cottage Grove ball after their own kickoff. In this case the strategy was ill-rewarded, however. On the next play Anderson fumbled the ball and Springfield recovered.

The Lions came back in the third quarter, starting a scoring march which was climaxed by Anderson's pass to Bob Summers for the second Grove tally. Anderson scored the extra point.

After this touchdown the Millers started a scoring march which carried them over for their only touchdown. The kick was wide of uprights on the try for the extra point.

In the fourth period Bush turned in a one man show by making large gains via end runs. He climaxed these by scoring the final touchdown of the game. Bush also scored the extra point.

This games leaves the Lions undefeated this season, having been tied once by University High. With the Springfield game over, the Grove rosters will have one eye on the key game with Lebanon next week.

Anderson and Bush turned in stellar performances in the backfield. Mickey, Schmitt and Picknell were outstanding in the line, however the entire team turned in a very creditable performance.

Not much doing in the line of fishing this week end. I spent Sunday on the lower Umpqua but did not even see a sign of a salmon. There were lots of boats on the river between Scottsburg and Reedsport Sunday morning but by 3 p.m. there were only a very few. I made several inquiries along the way to see if any salmon were being caught. From all I could find out there had been only a few caught all day. If the fish were there the water was just muddy enough that they wouldn't strike, although, several good catches were reported to have been made Saturday.

Several fishermen that I talked with had fished Sunday morning at Ten Mile lake and reported that there were no fish being caught there.

Oregon Wins and Staters Tie in Tilts Played Saturday

The Oregon Ducks evidently don't believe in big scores. The Ducks met and defeated the Washington University Huskies at Seattle Saturday by a score of 13 to 7. The reason the margin of victory was no greater was due to the fact that the Huskies played their best game of the season according to Coach Jim Aiken. The Ducks defense was set up for long passes on the theory that it was better to let several front passes thru rather than one pass from the rear.

The Ducks will meet UCLA at Los Angeles Saturday.

The Oregon State nine went thru a wild 26-26 tie with Washington State Saturday. In making the tie the Beavers managed to run up 201 yards on the ground and 142 yards thru the air.

Saturday the Beavers will meet the University of Utah at Bell Field in Corvallis in an inter-sectional tilt. The Beavers expect to have a real job in their ambition to revenge the 7 to 6 upset suffered against the University of Utah at Salt Lake last year.
