

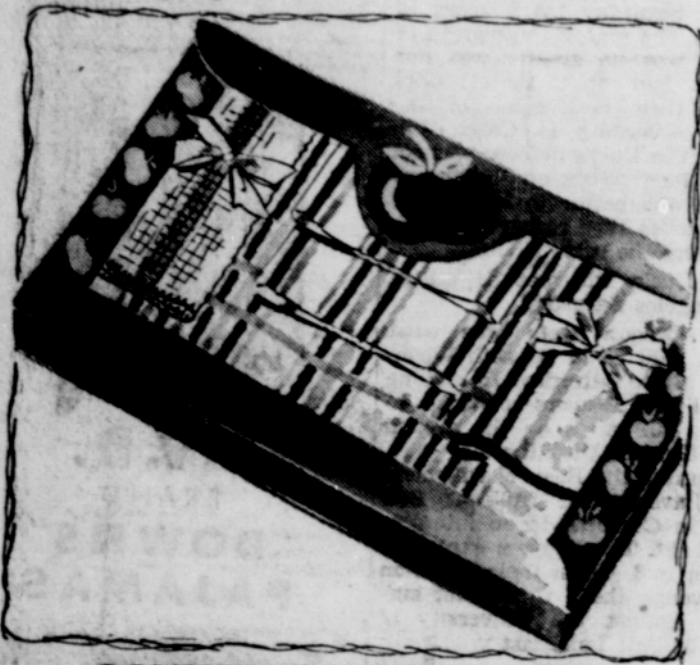

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Meal of the Week

Roast Chicken or Turkey with Sage Dressing
Giblet Gravy
Fluffy Mashed Potatoes
Green Peas
Orange and Grapefruit Salad with French Dressing
Pumpkin Pie (Recipe below)
NOTE: Stewed items (meal of the week specials) in ad will make the meal.

Pumpkin Pie

Broadcast: November 13, 1948
1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 1/2 cups pumpkin, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 1/2 cups fat milk, 2 1/2 teaspoons beaten egg, pumpkin pie spice, 2 tablespoons dark molasses

Turn on oven; set at very hot (450° F.). Mix brown sugar, flour, salt and spice. Stir in pumpkin, milk, egg and molasses. Pour into deep 9-inch pie pan lined with unbaked pastry. Bake 15 minutes, then reduce heat to slow (325° F.) and bake about 40 minutes, or until firm.
*A mixture of 1 teasp. cinnamon, 1/2 teasp. cloves and 1/2 teasp. each of nutmeg and ginger can replace pumpkin pie spice.

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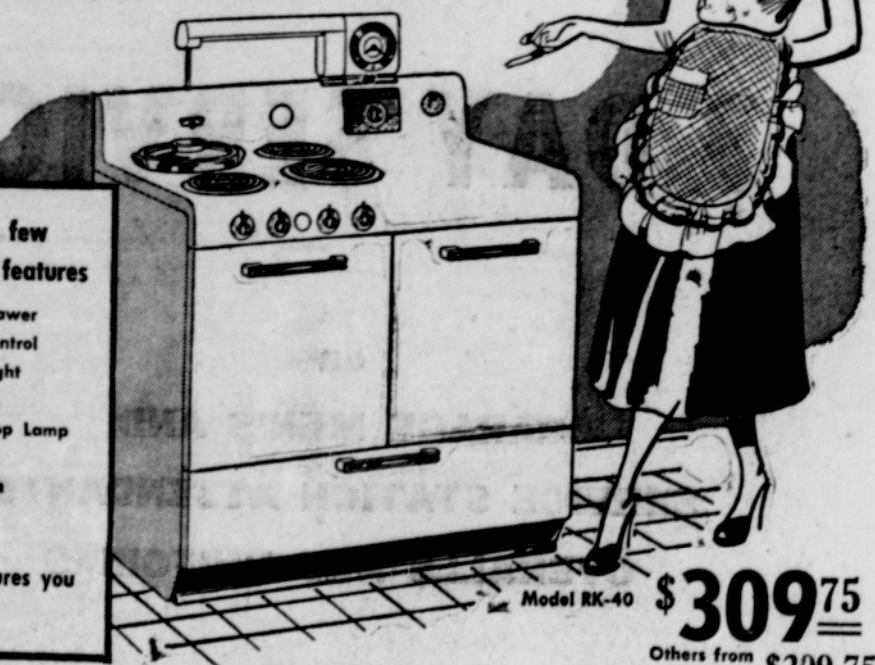
