Lily Bulbs Are Up Some; Market Outlook Is Poor

Lily bulbs are up some this year, but the stronger market is due to a poor crop last year and to the fact a number of growers left their bulbs in the fields, local growers report. There has been a fair sale of bulbs of six inches or better. The market for the past two or three years forced all but the largest growers out of business, but unless conditions improve the six remaining growers here don't intend to continue to grow bulbs, it was understood.

There are more small patches of lily bulbs. Those who have stayed in the game have been planting an acre or more. The market outlook all depends on foreign competition, which in recent years has produced bulbs cheaper than the growers here because of cheaper labor.

R. F. Thom with the county agent's office estimates that there are still about 100 acres grown in the county.
