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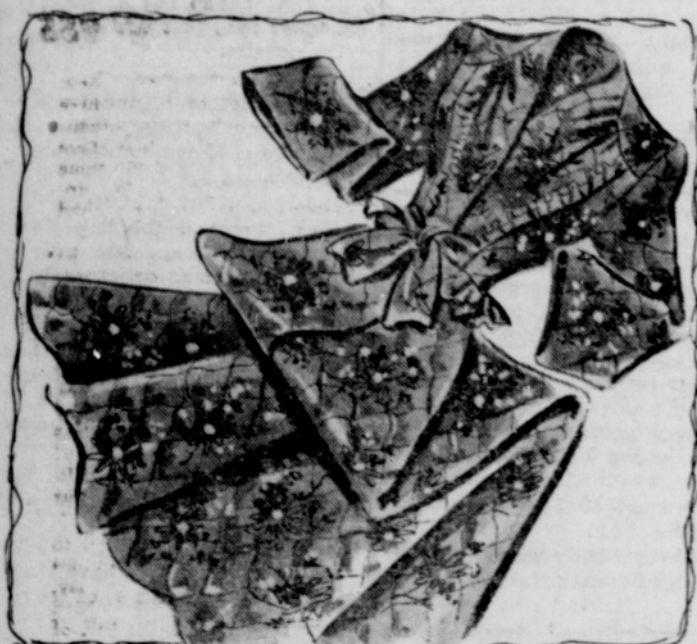

Slim Chance for Lower Prices of Women's Clothing

If you've been putting off buying that new suit or dress awaiting lower prices, the cards are stacked against you.

Unless there is a sudden change in the overall economic scene, its likely that most clothing will remain high during the coming winter. That is the opinion of Miss Lucy Lane, OSC extension specialist in clothing and textiles.

Some relief is in sight, however, for prices on such clothing items as men's shirts, pajamas and underwear as well as women's hosiery, she believes. Demand for men's overcoats is down and the trade reports some carry-over of stocks from last year.

The clothing specialist reports that some manufacturers are reducing the amount of fabric, quality of construction and trimmings to meet consumers resistance to rising prices in familiar price lines. Despite this hidden price boost, Miss Lane declares that fabric and workmanship in women's clothing, for instance, is the best now since 1941.

Clothing prices leveled off in the spring and late summer of 1947. This temporary halt in the rising spiral of clothing prices was followed by a 7 percent increase to March 1948. Now again, according to Miss Lane, a leveling off is taking place in cotton and rayon goods, but this is not true

of wools, especially the finer ones. Footwear prices moved upwards about 9 percent during the 1947-48 winter months and are still inclined to move higher.

While the 1948 cotton crop is the largest on record since 1937, wool prices are again moving upwards caused by greatly reduced production, forwarding consumers of higher prices for wool garments in the coming months.

Miss Lane predicts little or no immediate change in clothing prices, at least until after the Christmas shopping days.

Turkey Chowder
(Recipe below)

Turkey Chowder

Broadcast: November 27, 1948
1 left-over roasted turkey or chicken
3 1/2 cups water
1/2 cup finely cut onion
1/2 cup washed, raw rice
2 tablespoons shortening
1 1/2 cups Fat Milk

Dice 1/2 cup meat from left-over turkey carcass. Cook onion slowly in shortening until yellow. Add turkey bones, water, salt and pepper. Heat to boiling; add rice. Cover; boil slowly 30 minutes, or until rice is tender, stirring occasionally. Remove turkey bones. Add meat to soup. Stir in milk. Heat thoroughly. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.
