Fishing has not been too good on the lower Umpqua the past week because of the heavy rains. The latter part of last week, if the rains are not too bad the rest of this week, both silver and chinook fishing should be fairly good this coming week end.

Steelhead have been reported both above and below Elktion.

Garland Kimble and Jack Maudling caught three silvers in Smith River last week end. The fish were caught on a two-tone wobbler.

Fishing seemed exceptionally good the first of the week in Ten Mile creek. Granddad Mack Mobley, who is 84 years of age, and the party with him caught four salmon and five jack salmon in only a matter of a few hours. Granddad caught his limit on a

Bear Valley #5 spinner. He is all ready to go back and try it again.

OREGON TRAPPING SEASON OPENS

The trapping season in Oregon for mink, muskrat, otter and raccoon opened Monday, November 15. Chet Kebbe, in charge of furbearers for the Oregon State Game Commission, called attention to the fact that although no person is required to purchase a trapper's license to trap furbearing animals upon land that he owns, all trappers whether trapping on their own or other lands are required to file a report of the number and species taken with the Game Commission. He also pointed out that those trapping on their own lands are required to register the location of the land with the Commission.

Trout Liberations Completed for '48

Trout liberations of the Oregon State Game Commission were recently completed for 1948. Liberating almost two and one half million legal size trout this year the total poundage exceeds any previous year in Oregon. Total figures have not as yet been tabulated but by the end of August the five liberation trucks, pack strings and the Commission employed aeroplanes had liberated a total of 18,370,999 that weighed 333,097 pounds. The total poundage for the year exceeds 170 tons.

Late liberation were composed of small trout the legal sized plantings having been made just before and during the open season for trout fishing. The smaller fish were also used for packing to lakes that cannot be reached by road. Approximately 280 of these lakes were stocked by pack horse strings and aeroplanes.

The extensive use of an aeroplane for trout liberation in inaccessible lakes is new in Oregon although some experimental work had been done in the past. A tank was fitted to the under side of the plane. This tank was equipped with an aereating device and a flap type hinged door that was sealed on a water tight gasket. In the actual liberation the pilot would pass over the edge of the lake, trip the door and pull the plane up sharply. This resulted in less forward progress of the trout as well as helping to empty the tank. A full load would be released in about seven seconds. Checks at the lakes showed mortalities less than those normally present in horse packing similar fish. Thirty-five lakes in the Cascades were stocked by this method.

Four Awards Presented To Lions Football Squad

Highlighting the conclusion of a successful season by the Cottage Grove high school football team was the annual banquet sponsored by the Lions club at the high school cafeteria last evening. The football boys find themselves at the end of the season in much the same position as the University of Oregon minus the Rose Bowl; they are potential champions of the Tri-County league without the crown. This thought was expressed by more than one speaker in the program which followed in which the awards were made.

Orlo Bagley, one time high school coach, served as master of ceremonies and introduced the guests as well as the speakers appearing on the program. One promise of interest to those who want a football field was made by Supt. Virgil Kingsley that the school board still contemplates starting work on the field as soon as conditions will permit. The project will include a new field with stands, Kingsley said.

Bob Dusenberry related a fact that should interest all followers of high school football in introducing the various 1948 squad members and this was to the effect that the Lions have won 20 out of the last 21 games played. Dusenberry introduced each squad member giving a brief history of each player. Graduation will hit the squad hard this year, he said and he has the usual coach gloom in predicting a winning team for another year. However the most satisfying feat of the present team is that "Cottage Grove was not supposed to have a winning team at the start of the season this year." This was mentioned by Toastmaster Bagley.

Terry Picknell won the coveted Register-Guard cup as the most outstanding class A player in Lane county. Presentation of the cup was made by Bill Love, Register-Guard sports writer. The Twin Oaks trophy was awarded Bob Summers and the letterman's award went to Dick Schmitt. A trophy awarded by the vote of the squad went to Harlan Mickey. Coach Dusenberry announced that he would award 18 letters in football this year. Seven of the 18 letters will go to seniors.

Dick Strite, editor of the Register-Guard sports page was introduced along with the two principal speakers of the evening, Frank Zazula, back field coach at the University of Oregon and Dick Miller, line coach at the University.

Both Zazula and Miller told of some of the methods used in trying to train the university football players; that the boys were trained for a rough and tough life and that the players were not permitted to drink or smoke and were required to keep regular hours. Also both speakers urged prospective players to attend some school in the state. "Naturally we would like to have your best players, but if we can't get them, then we would advise them to go to some other state school."

All Star Team Tri-County League Named by Coaches

EUGENE, Nov. 23 — "To the victor goes the spoils" is an old political proverb, and the phrase could very well hold true when applied to the 1948 edition of the Tri-County league high school football all-stars. The team, selected by the coaches of the member schools, is dominated by Lebanon in the northern division and University High and Cottage Grove's co-champions in the south.

Again this year the team was split up with an all-star squad from the north and south, both separate from the other.

Lebanon, the official Tri-County league champion placed four men on the northern team. In the south University High collected six berths and Cottage Grove four.

Perhaps keynoting the tightness of the competition for the berths on the mythical dream team was the fact that only one player on either team was a unanimous selection. He was Bob Newburn, University High's aerial-minded quarterback. Several others were head and shoulders above anyone else at their position but, too, in many instances the players made the team by the "skin of their teeth."

Were you to pit the northern all-stars against those from the south a winner in a game would be hard to pick, indeed. Most positions were as strong or stronger than on any other past team. But then, this seems logical when you figure that over a series of games, neither Cottage Grove, Lebanon nor University High could hold a decisive margin over the other two.

But to the teams that were selected by Coaches Bob Dusenberry of Cottage Grove, Bud Page of Lebanon, Ray Hendrickson of University, Jim Mulvihill of Elmira, Earle Vossen of Junction City, Father J. J. Linehan of St. Mary's, Jack Frost of Sweet Home, Lyle Pettijohn of Toledo, Robert Donovan of Taft and Jerry Mosby of Newport.

Three of the players on the southern team are repeaters. They are Newburn, Bob Summers and Terry Picknell of Cottage Grove. Position by position the team goes: Harlan Mickey, Cottage Grove at left end. Of the ballots for the end positions Mickey and Howard Swan, UHS, were head and shoulders above everyone else and as such easily rated the team. Both were "lions" on defense and excellent pass catchers.

The tackle spots fell to Jim Miller, University co-captain, and Red Engert of Cottage Grove, a couple of scrappy, talented "mules."

Picknell was the right guard, and at the other spot a fellow who caught the eye of everyone who saw him play, Tiny Jerry Brown of St. Mary's, was an easy selection. Incidentally he was the only player to crash the elite circle from a team other than Grove or University.

Dick Applegate of UHS, a third team selection last year, stole the center spot from Grove's Dick Schmitt, who this year was dropped to the second team.

Three backfield selections were easy choices. Newburn, Kenny Warren of University and Bob Summers of Grove. But the last spot, was a real dog fight among Jim McKay of Junction, Rollo Bush of Cottage Grove and Dick Williams, of UHS. Williams won out and McKay, a '47 all-star, was forced to drop to the second team. In the north most spots weren't even close except at the left guard, right tackle and quarterback posts. At these spots selections were tough, and in one—the right tackle spot, the flip of a coin gave Rick Christianson of Newport the nod over Hal Bogert of Toledo.

Ted Anderson of Newport, a 16-year-old sophomore, was nearly unanimous at the left end spot as was Dick Duncan of Lebanon at left tackle. Lawrence Neal of Toledo edged out Chuck Pappen of Sweet Home for a starting guard spot.

Lebanon co-captain and outstanding player, Dick Houghton, came close to being unanimous as the other guard.

John Schneider of Newport was far ahead of the other center candidates. The right end spot was Tex Stevenson's of Sweet Home in a walkaway.

The backfield found the same situation as in the south with three "cinches" and one close one. The close one was at quarterback where Dick Norquist of Sweet Home barely beat out Gale Wilkening, a teammate.

Don Hebert and Jack Evans, the Lebanon halfback twins, were easily the wingbacks on the all-star team.

Jess Fogarty, a '47 all-star was again the starting fullback. Besides Fogarty, Houghton and Schneider were repeaters.

In the final scoring tabulations Kenny Warren of University was the leader with 48 points, while Jack Evans of Lebanon, with 39, snatched the championship from Anderson, with 38, in the north.

OREGON U. GRIDDERS MISSED ROSE BOWL

California won the right to represent the west coast at the Rose Bowl football classic on New Years Day. It was California over the Oregon University, which had completed one of its best seasons. Selecting of the winning team was made by ten Pacific coast conference coaches, but the results of the voting was not announced. The announcement anxiously awaited since Saturday was received Monday afternoon. Oregon, which finished the season untied and undefeated so far as the conference goes has not played in the Rose Bowl since 1920. California scored 277 to its opponents 80 in winning 10 games this year and this record puts California in the Rose Bowl for the first time in eleven years.

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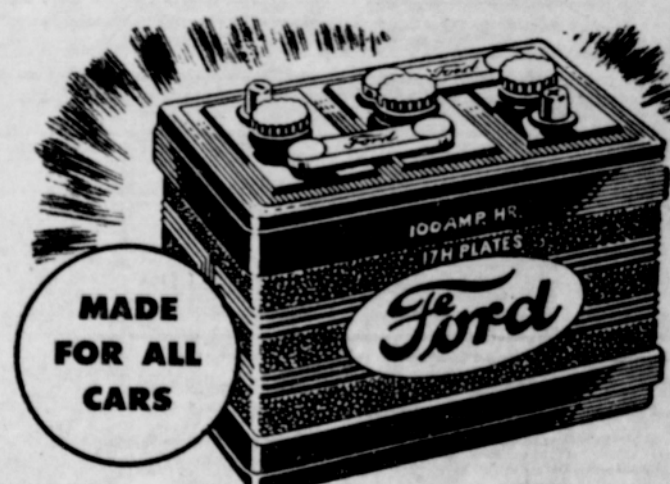
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
