New Grazing Lease Regulations Are Approved Under Taylor Grazing Law

Approval of new regulations of the Bureau of Land Management for handling grazing leases issued under Section 15 of the Taylor Grazing Act in more than 75 conveniently-located field offices in the 13 Western States, was announced today by Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug. The new rules were drafted as part of the general program of the Department of the Interior for more efficient decentralized administration of the public lands under the jurisdiction of the Bureau in continental United States and Alaska.

The basic change brought about by the new regulations is the designation of "signing officers" in the field who will have authority to act in matters relating to grazing leases, instead of requiring that each lease must be acted upon in Washington, Bureau Director Marion Clawson explained. It

is expected that signing officials normally will be district grazers, or in some cases managers of district land offices or district foresters, but application for Section 15 grazing leases may be filed in any field office of the Bureau in the state in which the land is situated. In general, the leases will be granted for periods up to 10 years, subject to revision at the end of each 3-year period.

Stockmen no longer must pay a filing fee in submitting applications for lease, but a uniform schedule of rental rates for livestock grazing is included in the new regulations. These rental rates range from one-tenth of a cent per acre per year for the least productive land, to 44 cents per acre per year for the best type of forage area.

Establishment by the Bureau of the simplified leasing system

marks the end of a cumbersome procedure in the administration of the public lands.

Following passage of the Taylor Grazing Act in 1934, administration of livestock grazing in Federal districts established under the act was handled thru issuance of permits in the field, first by the Division of Grazing and later by the Grazing Service of the Department of the Interior. However, Section 15 of the Act stipulated that grazing privileges on tracts of public land so situated as not to justify their inclusion in any grazing district, should be authorized under lease, and these leases were issued in Washington by the then General Land Office.

When the Grazing Service and the General Land Office were consolidated to form the Bureau of Land Management in 1946, plans were laid to simplify grazing administration, but restrictions written into the 1948 Interior Appropriation Act prohibited the transfer of grazing lease issuance into the field. Later, these restrictions were removed and the new regulations drafted to permit the handling of permits for land within grazing districts will continue to be handled in the field, as heretofore.

Records of the Bureau of Land Management show that approximately 10,600 "Section 15 leases" covering more than 12,210,000 acres of public land were in effect during the 1948 fiscal year. Each of these leases was issued from Washington under the old procedure now replaced by the new regulations.

More than 3,093,000 acres of public land in Wyoming are held under Section 15 leases, according to Bureau tabulations. California ranks second, with 2,979,797 acres, and Arizona third, with 2,232,356 acres.

Region #1 including Oregon, Idaho and Washington includes 1,144,255 acres of range lands which are leased for grazing. Of this total 584,722 acres are in Oregon, 231,283 acres are in Idaho and 328,250 acres are in Washington.

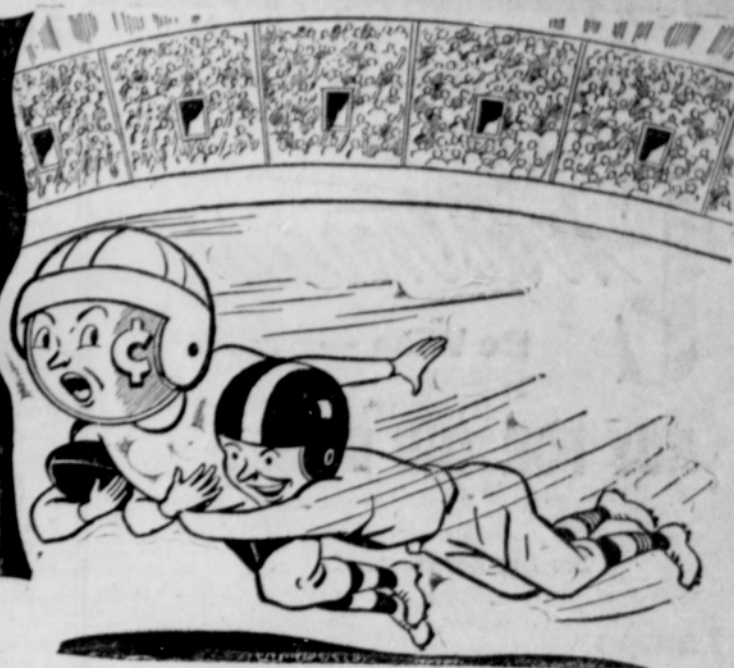

AND: "any person who shall break or rob in any manner, or who shall attempt to break or rob, any flume, rocker, quartz mill, quartz vein or lode, bed rock sluice, sluice box, or MINING CLAIM not his own; or who shall TRESPASS UPON such mining claim . . . shall . . . be punished by imprisonment . . . not . . . more than five years, or by fine . . . not . . . more than \$1000, or both." Oreg. Laws Sec. 14-374.
