Atomic Heredity Change Slow but Is Most Certain

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Hereditary effects of radiation from atomic bombing and similar exposures may not show up for several generations but will inevitably affect the future of the race, Dr. H. J. Muller, Nobel prize winner and professor of zoology at Indiana University, told those attending the annual Sigma Xi fall lecture here. Sigma Xi is the honor society for research scientists.

Dr. Muller, making a tour of Sigma Xi chapters throughout the middle and far west said that high frequency radiation, such as from X-rays and those from atomic energy, is the only thing yet found to affect heredity, and then only if reproductive tissues are involved.

Even minute exposure of such tissues, however, causes changes that will accumulate and lie dormant like time bombs ready to show up in the distant future when two characters similarly affected happen to meet. The delay in appearance is likely to make people unduly reckless of such effects, Dr. Muller warned.

PIE CRUST

MINCE PIES ARE IN SEASON!

Use this recipe for easy, flaky pie crust to do justice to your spicy mince for the holidays.

2 cups Fisher's Blend Flour
1 teaspoon Salt
3/4 cup Shortening
