Ducks Will Meet SMU in Cotton Bowl at Dallas

University of Oregon's football team will meet Southern Methodist in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Texas., on New Year's Day. The official announcement that Oregon had accepted a Cotton Bowl bid came from Dallas and was announced from Eugene.

Shortly after an official announcement from Dallas, President Harry K. Newburn of Oregon revealed that the Eugene school had received an invitation to the Dallas classic Thanksgiving morning. The invitation advised that the host Southern Methodist team had voted unanimously to invite Oregon.

Newburn and Leo Harris, Web-foot athletic director, were notified at noon Saturday that the Pacific Coast conference approved Oregon's acceptance of the bid.

"We're proud and happy to have been invited by the Cotton Bowl," said Harris, "and we're very appreciative to the faculty representatives of the conference for granting us permission to play."

Meanwhile Oregon's coach Jim Aiken was in Dallas Saturday watching Southern Methodist pull out a 7-7 tie with Texas Christian. Aiken later was quoted as saying that the Methodist club would be a tough bunch to beat.

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Lions to Begin 28 Cage Game Schedule Dec. 3rd

On December 3, the Cottage Grove Union high school Lions will begin one of the toughest basketball schedules they have attempted. A 28 game schedule against some of the leading high schools in the state, as well as Frosh quintets from Oregon Normal and the University of Oregon, will be played.

Three reserve lettermen are in the fold, Don Eastburn, Bob Gasper and Ronald Chapman. Up from the "B" squad are Champ Husted, Larry Wolfard, Ben Hilliker and Jerry Miller. Two newcomers to the squad are Larry Anderson and Vernon Coop.

Roger Peterson is working with a 16 man "B" squad with Albert Martin, Marly Martin, Red Engert and Jim Wear as the more promising looking members. Virg Dalberg has a promising looking bunch of frosh hoopers out, bolstered chiefly by Bud Neal's good Jefferson grade team of last year. Regulars of this team include Bill McBee, Wes Malcolm, Don Mooney, Harold Lunau and Duane Radloff.

Next week we will see a full slate of local action, as the locals open up against Drain on Tuesday night, have North Bend here on Friday night and then the Sweet Home Huskies here Saturday. All games on the local court will start with a preliminary game at 6:45 p.m. and the main game at 8:00.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis — By trouncing Nebraska, 28-12, in the final regular game of the 1948 season Oregon State's high geared offensive football team wound up exactly at the 500 mark with four wins, four losses and three ties. The Beavers still have a post-season date remaining against the University of Hawaii in the Pineapple Bowl in Honolulu on New Year's day.

Although the Orange had just an average season as far as won and lost records go, Coach Lon Stiner turned out the highest scoring and most spectacular aggregation in modern foot ball history at Oregon State. In 11 games the Beavers, playing wide-open football, ran up 202 points. They failed to score on only two opponents, California and Oregon.

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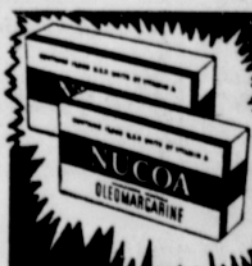
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
