Bryce Eastburn Is Promoted to J3/c

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27 —A naval correspondent who has written more home town stories than he can remember is now at Eighth Naval District headquarters here.

He is Bryce W. Eastburn, formerly of Cottage Grove, Oregon. He got himself in the news by getting promoted to journalist third class, USN, in excess of quota and by special authority of the Bureau of Naval Personnel in Washington D.C.

Eastburn is a broken-service sailor who spiced his career with a tour of civilian life ashore before returning to active duty. He was a boatswain's mate during a previous hitch in the Aleutian war. He later became an aviation cadet, but was discharged before obtaining his commission in order to enter college at the University of Oregon.

Later he spent a stint in Alaska as chairman on a surveying team. Eastburn re-enlisted in the Navy last January and was again sent to the Alaskan frontier, this time with the Office of Naval Intelligence. He is a graduate of the Navy's school of journalism at Great Lakes, Ill., and has been on duty here with Eighth Naval District headquarters since last Sept.

The naval correspondent is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Eastburn, Kobel, Calif. His daughter, April Kaye, lives at the Cottage Grove address.

Oregon Waterfowl Season Opened On December 23

At noon, Wednesday, December 23rd, the second half of Oregon's split season for duck and goose hunting season opened. The season will extend through January 8th. Duck stamps are issued on the basis of a year extending from July to July so the same stamp that was valid for the first half of the season will be valid through the whole season. Oregon hunting licenses are issued on the basis of the calendar year and it will be necessary to secure a 1949 hunting license to hunt waterfowl during the period from January first through the eighth. Hunting licenses for 1949 will be sold at the same rate that they were in 1948.

Sunrise and sunset tables for the month of Dec. are printed in the Oregon Hunters Guide for 1948. Following are the sunrise and sunset table for the first eight days of January, 1949.

Orangemen Off to Pineapple Bowl

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 28 — A 33 man Oregon State football squad left the Eugene airport early Wednesday morning in a chartered DC-6 for Honolulu where the Beavers will play the University of Hawaii in the sun-baked Pineapple bowl on New Year's day. In addition to the squad and coaching staff, Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State; Loris Baker, assistant athletic director; and Robert Knoll, alumni manager, accompanied the team.

The Beavers were scheduled to arrive in Honolulu Wednesday evening and planned to immediately set up headquarters at the Moana hotel. Although a full schedule of entertainment features has been arranged for the team, Coach Lon Stiner said the program before the game will be limited to sightseeing tours of the islands and daily workouts on the university's gridiron.

Highlight of the program arranged for the squad by the Pineapple bowl committee is expected to be a full-scale Luau which is scheduled for Sunday, January 2, from 5 to 8 p.m. A Luau is a traditional Hawaiian feast and festa in grand style. The feed will include Kalua pig, Lau Lau, poi and all the trimmings.

On the entertainment side a native Hawaiian troupe will present hula dances and native songs. This will be followed by a Judo exhibition. After the Luau, the Beavers will go moonlight surfboard riding and swimming at Waikiki beach.

The morning of December 30 the Orangemen will go through a pineapple factory and that afternoon hold their first workout in the islands. December 31 Stiner and his players will be taken on a tour of the sugar and pineapple plantations followed by another afternoon practice session.

After the game on New Year's day, the Orangemen will be special guests at a dance sponsored by the University of Hawaii. Another tour is booked for the morning of January 2 climaxed by the Luau. The squad will fly home on Jan. 3.
