## Freight Rates Are Boosted 5 Per Cent

WASHINGTON —The Interstate Commerce Commission Friday granted the railroads temporary freight rate increases averaging a little more than 5 per cent.

The railroads had asked for an 8 per cent temporary increase.

The increases authorized will remain in effect until the commission rules on the railroads' request for a permanent 13 per cent rate boost.

The increase the ICC said, will bring total accumulated increases in freight revenue since June, 1946, to about \$2,900,000,000 a year — an overall increase of 52 per cent.

In another order, the ICC also authorized the Railway Express Agency to increase its rates except in the West.

This will be done by applying the higher so-called western scale of rates to the nation as a whole. It was estimated that this would increase the company's revenues nearly \$7,000,000 a year.

The railroads were authorized to put the higher rates into effect upon five days notice to the public. This means five days after tariffs have been filed with the commission.

## EX-STATE POLICE CHIEF TO HEAD PORTLAND FORCE

PORTLAND —Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee Saturday chose Charles P. Pray, 70-year-old retired state police superintendent, as Portland's new police chief.

Pray, who retired in 1946, finally agreed to accept the post after refusing it several times.

Mrs. Lee, who became Portland's first woman mayor today, said the "intense factionalism now existing in the police bureau" led her to go outside the police department for a new chief. The present chief, James Fleming, will revert to a police captaincy.

## TOLL REACHES 229 OVER THE WEEK END

The new year was very brief for many Americans.

A survey showed Sunday at least 229 persons died violently

from 6 p.m. New Year's eve until early Sunday.

Traffic accidents killed 161 persons. Sixty-eight others died from a variety of miscellaneous mishaps including gunshots, drowning, plane crashes and fires.

The National Safety council had predicted 170 persons would die in traffic accidents during the New Year holiday week end.
