Tourney Bound Lions Roll Over Axemen 45-36

For the third time in history a Cottage Grove basketball team defeated a Eugene quintet here Friday night as the state-tournament-bound Lions rolled over the highly touted Axemen by a 45-36 score.

A packed house of approximately 1500, probably the largest crowd ever to witness a basketball game in Cottage Grove, watched a see-saw first half, and then center Bob Cook and forward Harlan Mickey as they paced a Lion second half rally to gain a sizeable lead and stave off last minute efforts of the Axemen. Cook was the high point man of the evening, adding 16 points to his 27 point performance last week in the season opener against Elmira. Mickey was second with 11. Johnson, Eugene's tall center, was held to 7.

From the opening basket by Marv Schaffer of the Lions, the first quarter was nip and tuck as both teams were hitting the hoop from all angles. The first period score was a tense 9-9. Eugene forged ahead for the only time during the evening in the second period only to see the Grovers bounce back and take command of a 22-16 halftime score.

The large Grove cheer section went wild in the third period as the Lions marched to an early ten point lead and held their own. The score at the end of three quarters of play was 28-18.

Desperate long shots by the Axemen as well as fast break attempts featured the final period, all to no avail as the accuracy from the field and defensive work of the Lions enabled them to maintain a large lead to the final whistle. The Grove team played their cleanest game of the season, having only 8 personal fouls called against them.

This was the second straight season win for the Grovers and gives them an inside track on district representation in the state playoffs. They have yet to lose a game on the local floor this year.

Severe Winter Is Rough on Game

Deep snows and extreme cold weather over the state may have serious effects on both the big game and the upland game of Oregon, it was announced today by C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor. He pointed out that although extensive feeding operations are being carried out and will be increased, the lack of browse on the winter ranges cannot be offset by even the most elaborate feeding program.

Heavy snows in the Baker area have driven elk and deer down onto the ranches in the valley and for two weeks the Game Commission has kept a crew busy establishing feed lines to alleviate damage. Mr. Lockwood emphasized that these measures are not long range solutions for the big game wintering problems but that they are strictly emergency measures.

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National Park Program

How to Put Out a Fire
When a fire is small, it can be put out easily. You can stamp it out with your foot, smother it with a rug or douse it with a pail of water.
