**2,000 Veterans Pay Their Taxes**

There's one class of property owners in Oregon enjoying a three percent discount on current taxes because they're paid in advance. These are some 2000 ex-service-men with state veterans' farm and home loans, whose taxes are paid annually by the Department of Veterans' Affairs and collected from the veterans on a monthly basis.

The department this week announced that \$97,973.78 was paid to tax collectors in the 26 Oregon Counties, representing 1948-1949 taxes due on properties held by the veteran borrowers. By paying ahead of the November 15 deadline, a three percent reduction in the tax was obtained.

Austin said it was necessary this year to revise veterans' monthly payments upward in the majority of counties, due to tax increases.

Taxes received from the veterans' department for loan properties in Lane county amounted to \$391,632.

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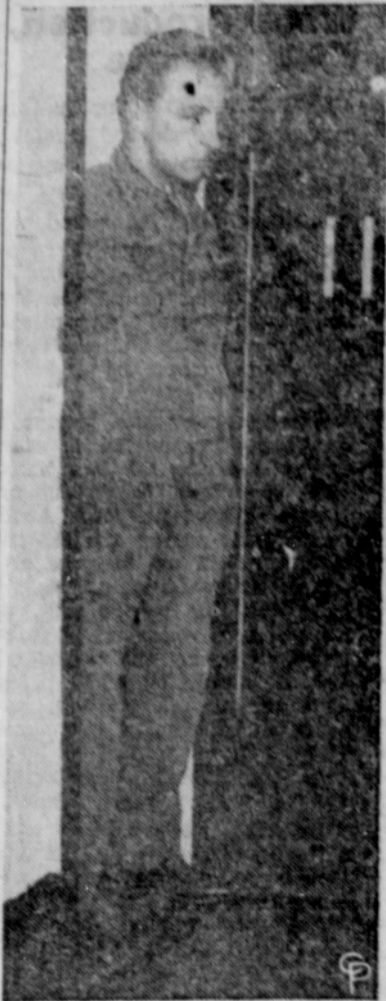

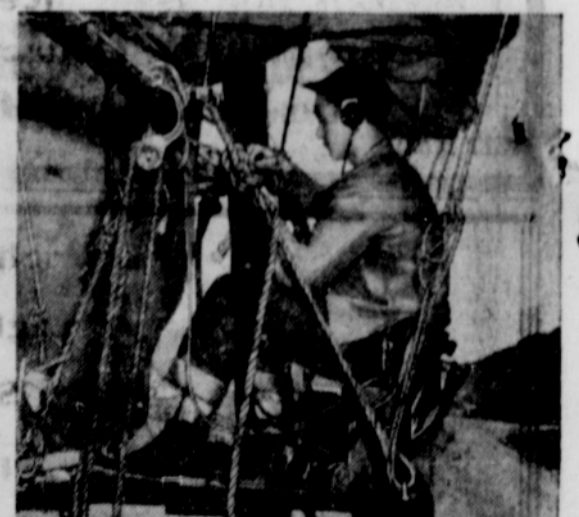
