### 300 Veterans to Train for Jobs With Phone Co.

A partial victory for World War II veterans in job training with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. in Oregon was reported this week by the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, which said the Veterans Administration central office in Washington, D. C., had approved the first two years of the phone company training program.

Last minute VA approval thus nullified a state apprenticeship council decision of last November disapproving the program because it did not meet state standards, and assures continued receipt of GI subsistence payments by nearly 300 veterans training for skilled jobs with the phone concern in Oregon, the state veterans' department said.

Regional VA officials in Portland said December subsistence checks were mailed these veterans immediately following central office's action.

Despite the surprise decision by VA, which ordinarily gives state agencies final say on GI training courses, the Oregon Veterans' department intimated that efforts will be continued to seek four-year approval.

### Oregon Dairymen List Many Topics For Annual Meet

Use of the new weedicide, 2,4,5-T, for control of brushy plants such as blackberry in western Oregon pastures will be among topics discussed by Virgil Freed, O.S.C. experiment station agronomist, during the 55th annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's association.

Dates for the convention, on the Oregon State college campus, are Jan. 17, 18 and 19. Roger Morse, O.S.C. extension dairyman, announced recently.

Annual meetings of the Oregon Guernsey, Hostein-Friesian and Jersey Cattle clubs will be held on January 17. The afternoon of the opening day, association committees will convene, dealing with dairy products promotion, herd improvement, disease control and resolutions.

Association President Judge W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass, will call the general session to order at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, January 18. During the morning session H. P. Ewalt, O.S.C. extension dairyman, and F. B. Wolberg, dairy department staff member, will discuss "Oregon's Testing Program." Minerals for dairy cattle will be the topic of Dr. J. R. Haag, experiment station chemist, to complete the morning program. Freed's discussion of weed control will be an afternoon feature.

Other speakers to appear before the group include Dr. C. F. Haynes, state veterinarian, Salem; Ben Simonson, manager, Oregon dairy breeders association, Corvallis; Director E. L. Peterson, state department of agriculture, Salem; and Leroy E. Warner, O.S.C. extension soil conservation specialist.

Of particular importance to dairymen will be the discussion on mastitis led by Dr. J. R. Schnautz, O.S.C. veterinary department.

A visit to the Oregon dairy breeders association bull stud north of Corvallis will be an added feature of the three-day meeting.

### AIR FORCE TO INCREASE CADET CLASSES TO EIGHT

Another base, Las Vegas AFB, Nevada, will be added to the seven bases at which Aviation Cadet training is given. Goodfellow AFB, San Angelo; Randolph AFB, San Antonio; Perrin AFB, Sherman; and Waco AFB, Waco, all in Texas, are used for the eight months of basic pilot training, after which Cadets go to Barksdale AFB, Shreveport, La., and to Enid AFB, Enid, Okla., for advanced twin-engine training; and to Williams AFB, Chandler, Ariz., and Las Vegas AFB for advanced single-engine training.
