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Funeral Services For J. H. Bennett

Funeral services were held Wednesday, January 19th, for James Harvey Bennett, at 2:30 p.m. at Mills Mortuary under the auspices of the IOOF Cottage Grove Lodge No. 68, with the Rev. Ed Powell officiating. Interment was in the local IOOF cemetery.

Mr. Bennett passed away at his home at 310 North Douglas Saturday, January 15th, at the age of 86 years, following a long illness. He was born January 12, 1863 in Iowa, and married in Kansas to Emma Ward on December 10, 1882. She passed away in March, 1929. He had been a resident of Cottage Grove for 30 years, coming from Kansas. He was a member of the Gibbs Avenue Church of Christ and an active member of the local Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.

Rites for Philip R. Gray Will Be Held Jan. 22nd

Philip Richard Gray, Captain, Co. D, 27th Marine Regiment, Fifth Division, was killed in action on Iwo Jima Feb. 28, 1945. He was born at Buckingham, Colo. March 17, 1918, and was educated at Scottsbluff and Mitchell, Neb. He also attended school at Creswell and Junction City, and was graduated from Oregon State College in 1941.

Captain Gray took Marine training at Quantico, Va., and was one of five Marines chosen to receive paratrooper training in California. He served in the South Pacific for a year, and was at Vella Lavella, Choiseul and Bougainville. He landed on Iwo Jima Feb. 19, 1945. The Navy Cross was awarded posthumously to his widow.

He was married Feb. 22, 1943 to Winona Kyle of Jewell, Ore. Besides his widow he is survived by parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Gray, of Cottage Grove; a sister, Mrs. George L. Potter, Pleasant Hill; three brothers, Gene, of Scottsbluff, Robert, of Pleasant Hill, and Frank, of Portland. He was a member of the Eugene First Baptist Church.

Services will be at First Baptist Church in Eugene, Saturday, Jan. 22 at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Vance Webster officiating. Burial will be in Rest Haven Memorial Park.

OREGON LAW BANS SALE OF THREE "COMIC BOOKS"

The sale of three so-called comic book periodicals is held to be prohibited by section 23-924, O.C.L.A. (1940), according to an opinion of the attorney general. The periodicals were described on their covers as: "True Crime No. 9, Crime Patrol, An Entertaining Comic," "Women Outlaws, Nov.," and "Wanted Jack Paris Comics, Nov. 1948." The opinion stated that the Oregon law is constitutional despite the recent United States Supreme Court decision in the case of Winters v. New York, which held a New York statute similar to the Oregon statute too vague to uphold a prosecution thereunder. The attorney general's opinion pointed out that it is quite probable that the Oregon statute can be distinguished from the New York statute to the extent that the indefiniteness referred to by the United States Supreme Court is not present in the Oregon statute. The opinion states that the validity of the Oregon statute has not been questioned in the courts of Oregon and that is presumed to be constitutional.

PROPOSAL WOULD CUT COST OF BRIDGE FOR SMITH RIVER

The Douglas county court, accompanied by state and army engineers, last week visited the site of the proposed Smith river bridge to see if changes could be made in the proposed structure to reduce the cost.

The county budget provides \$150,000 for a bridge to open up the area on the north side of the Umpqua river east of Smith River but low bids submitted recently were considerably in excess of the budgeted amount. Changes proposed would cut the cost about \$40,000.

The court determined the best move would be to alter the plans, provided approval could be obtained from the army engineers. This would be necessary as the structure involves crossing a navigable stream. — Roseburg News-Review.

OSC REGISTRATION CLIMBS

Oregon State College—Registration for winter term so far has shown an increase of 1 per cent over the record second term enrollment a year ago, despite a decline of 6 per cent in the number of veterans receiving educational aid. At the end of 10 days the total was 7059 with additional late comers certain to exceed last year's final figure of 7070.

White was arrested and released on \$100 bond.

Others involved in the Sunday night affair were John D. Murphy and Keith Pullen, bartenders; Bill Moon, Florence patrolman, and Ernie Tatum, Florence fisherman.

Tatum said he, Pullen and Murphy were put in the same cell and that tear gas was discharged into it.

State Police Sgt. Lyle Harrell said the truck driver was Murray F. Canova, Sutherlin, who was uninjured, and with him was Charles Stone, Sutherlin, who sustained a nose injury.

The Patton car was not overturned, but the front part was badly smashed. Some difficulty was experienced in extricating the woman from the car. — Roseburg News-Review.

Coach Warren will spend a good part of the practice time this week devising some type of defense for Sammy White, the brilliant Washington ace. Warren does not have hopes of stopping

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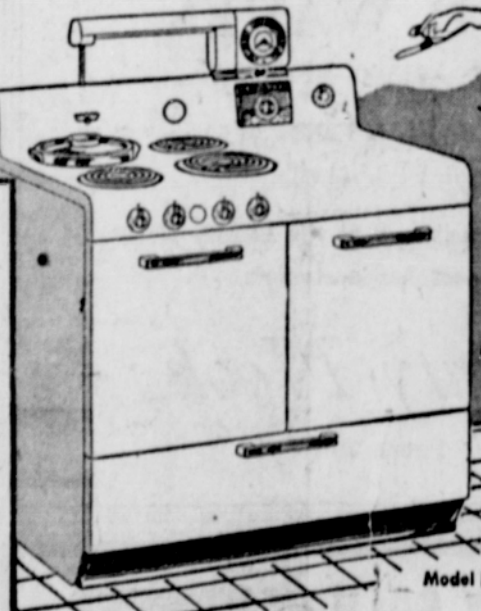
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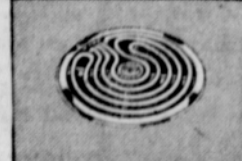


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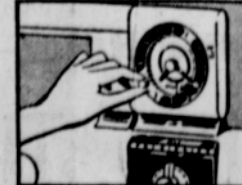
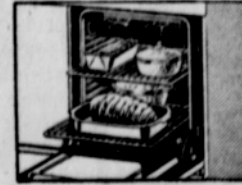
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
