SPECIALTY CROP ACREAGE TRIPLED IN RECENT YEARS
Oregon farm acreage devoted to specialty crops has more than tripled in the 30 years following world war I, according to figures included in a recent O. S. C. experiment bulletin, "Oregon's Capacity to Produce."

In 1919 only a little more than 5 per cent of the crop land was used for tree fruits and nuts, small fruits potatoes and truck crops, and other specialties such as forage seed crops. Now 16 per cent of the crop land is used for these.
