SUNSHINE CIRCLE

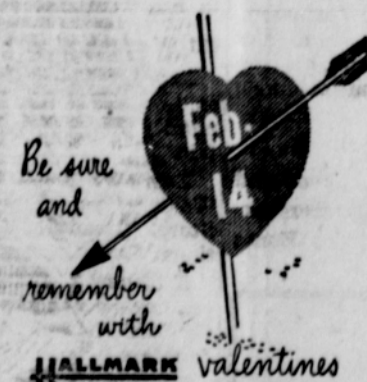
Mrs. Frank McGarvin will be hostess to the Sunshine circle next Tuesday at an all day meeting. Those having birthdays will be honored at the noon meal.

Meal of the Week BY MARY LEE TAYLOR

Braised Pork Chops
Glazed Sweet Potatoes
Creamed Cauliflower
Lettuce Wedges with Salad Dressing
Broad Butter or Margarine
Danish Fruit Pudding (Recipe below)

NOTE: Stewed items (meal of the week specials) in ad will make this meal.

Danish Fruit Pudding

Broadcast: January 29, 1949

1/2 cup Fat Milk
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup pruned juice
1/2 cup canned fruit cocktail juice
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup finely cut, cooked, pitted prunes
1/2 cup drained, canned fruit cocktail juice
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Chill milk until ice cold. Rub with vegetable oil or rinse with cold water a quart mold. Soften gelatin in water. Heat to boiling a mixture of pruned juice, fruit cocktail juice, sugar and salt. Remove from heat; stir in gelatin. Add prunes and fruit cocktail. Chill until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Whip chilled milk with cold rotary beater, or electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add lemon juice; whip until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Put into mold. Chill until firm. Makes 4 servings.

*Canned, crushed pineapple and juice also can be used.
