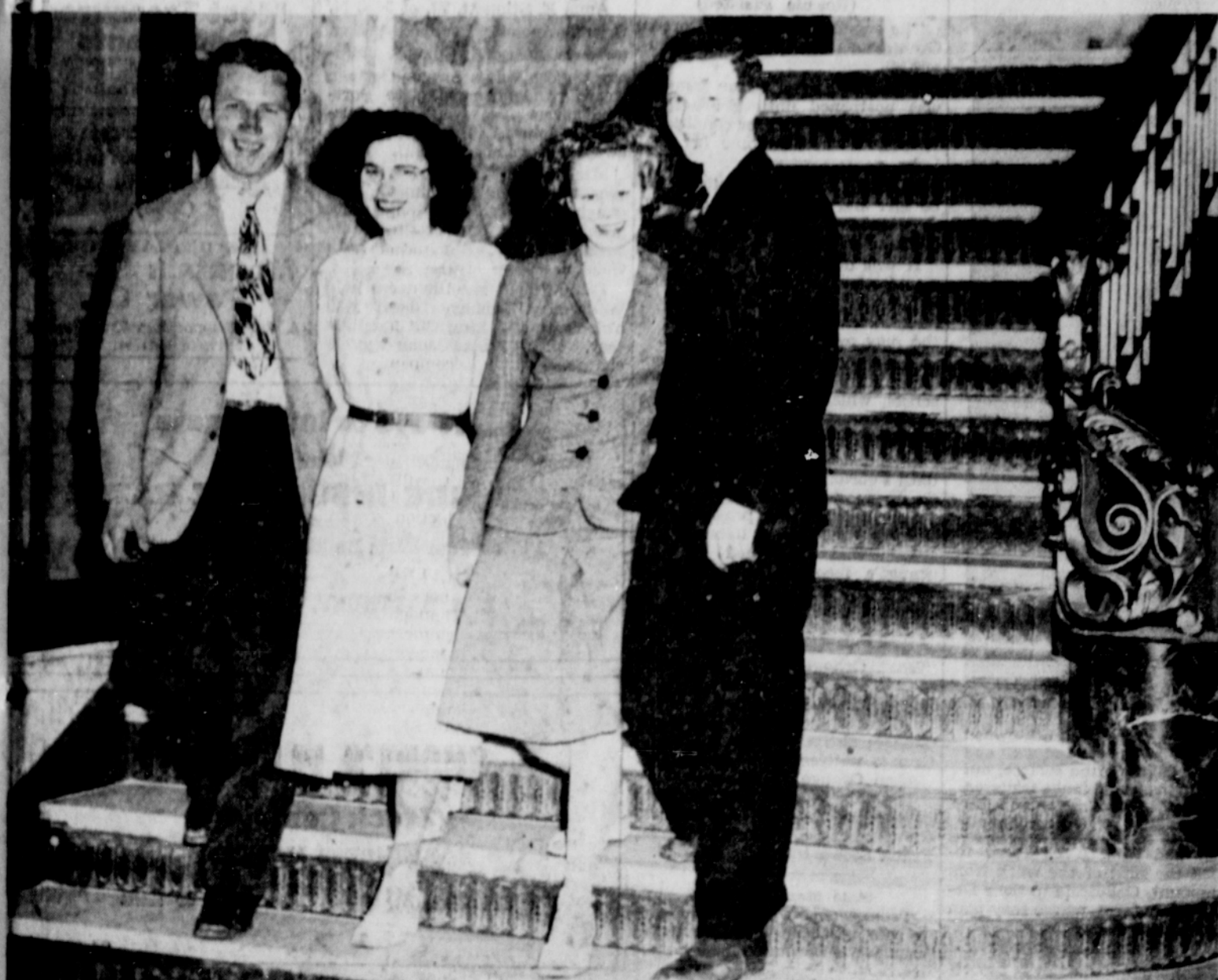


Two Local Couples Exchange Wedding Vows At Reno, Nevada

Wheeler-Osgood Adds Equipment To Speed Output

The Wheeler-Osgood Lumber Co., mill at Disston has taken advantage of the inclement weather to install improvements designed to speed up the production of the mill. According to

Lloyd Plowman, sawyer, the installations include live transfers behind the edger, single air trimmer and live rolls to the air trimmer and stop and go transfer chains to the trimmer.

These improvements will add about 5,000 to 6,000 feet to the daily capacity of the mill. The former capacity was 55,000 to 60,000 feet daily.

Rural Pastors To Study Souls and Soils in Summer

"Conservation of Souls and Soils" was selected as the theme of the fourth annual Leadership Institute for Town and Country Churches at Oregon State College next summer.

The planning committee that met recently also selected the dates June 28-July 1 inclusive as the time for the institute and set a goal of at least 100 persons in residence through the period as an objective this year.

Representatives of all sponsoring groups were present for the planning committee session, including those from the Home Missions Council of North America, the Oregon Council of Churches, the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, several denominations not represented in the Oregon council, and the college.

In picking the theme for the 1949 institute the committee said as much emphasis will be placed on souls and religious training as on soils, and that the program will include such related features as rural recreation, group singing, visual aids, rural surveys and the results of recent Oregon rural church conferences.

W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of extension, was named chairman of this year's conference and of the planning committee which will meet again March 22 at O.S.C. Committees were also authorized on program, arrangements and publicity.

Potato Goals Are Being Established

Acreage goals for the 1949 Oregon crop of Irish potatoes are now being established in county agricultural conservation offices throughout the state, according to Ernest E. Schrenk, chairman, Lane County ACA Committee. Goals for the 1949 crop will be one set up for individual farms.

Planting within the established goal will be one of the conditions for eligibility to participate in the 1949 potato price support program.

Establishment of acreage goals or allotments for this coming year's potato crop applies only to commercial potato growers—those who have produced 3.0 acres or more each year in 1945, 1946, 1947 and 1948. Since Lane county has no listed commercial potato growers with potato acreage history for these years, any commercial potato grower must request the establishment of a 1949 goal if he wishes to be eligible for the price support provisions of the 1949 potato program.

Requests for consideration and establishment of 1949 potato goal shall be forwarded to the Lane County Agricultural Conservation Association, Public Market Building, Eugene, Oregon and such requests must be on file with that office within the next few weeks, preferably by January 31, 1949.

Schrenk also stated that any farmer can grow up to 2.9 acres of potatoes in 1949 without losing eligibility to participate in the 1949 potato price support program.

HIGHER PAY FOR DOUGLAS COUNTY OFFICERS

Douglas county officials would receive a 10 per cent salary boost in the next two years, under a bill introduced in the Legislature Friday by the county's House delegation.

The county judge would get \$4,400 a year, the treasurer \$3,400, and the following would get \$4,000: Commissioners, clerk, sheriff, school superintendent, and assessor.

County judge D. N. Busenbark said the legislation had been requested because such increases are granted only for two-year periods. They are granted by the Legislature only until the next biennial session.

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Dorcas Society Reports Activities

During the year 1948 the Dorcas Society of the Cottage Grove Seventh-day Adventist church met on the average of twice a month to prepare clothing and food for local and foreign relief. Services rendered for the year, which included food, clothing, freight expenses, and treatments, amounted to \$2,737.00. Five hundred thirty-four hours were spent in the collection, preparation, and distribution of these materials.

Two thousand one hundred ninety-one pieces of clothing were given away during the year, one-half of which were used locally (some for flood relief), the rest being sent abroad. Of the 2,191 articles, about 500 were donated by Seventh-day Adventists church members, the remainder being given by other local citizens. There is still a great demand for clothing—both for foreign relief and for local emergencies. Those having any type of wearing apparel to donate may leave it at Mrs. Quall's Alteration Shop on Main Street above Peterson's Department Store.

2-4-D BULLETIN REVISED

The O.C.S. extension bulletin No. 687, "2-4-D as a Weed Killer in Oregon," has proved so popular that it has just been reprinted with some revisions by the authors Virgil Freed and Rex Warren, specialists of experiment station and extension services, respectively. While the bulletin contains much later information, the authors warn that there are still broad gaps in the knowledge of the powerful new chemical weed killers. Farmers are warned to use 2-4-D with caution in situations for which there are no recommendations.
