Rod and Gun Club Shooting for 500 Members by Mch. 1

The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club will hold its regular meeting Monday February 7 at Petersen's hall. All members are urged to attend and bring their dues books, so an accurate count can be made of the present membership. Remember "500 Members by March 1st."

There will be a merchandise trap shoot at the club grounds, Sunday February 6th. It is planned to hold shoots every other Sunday, commencing with February 6. These shoots have proven very popular, and the trap shoot committee feels that it is advisable to hold shoots more often than they have in the past.

The rafters have all been raised on the new building, and it is now ready for shooting. This building when completed will be 24 by 88 feet with an 8 by 60 porch and balcony on the north side. Plans are being discussed for a moving shooting gallery to be incorporated into the fifty foot rifle range which will be on the second floor.

If this building is to be finished this spring, there is going to have to be a better turn out of help, as well as donations in materials. The past week there has not been enough help to accomplish as much as should have been done. In spite of the present shortage of material, there is still a great amount of work to be done.

Friendly Hippo

The hippopotamus is not a hostile animal. He will make no aggressive move, and if he moves at all it will be to submerge. The hippo feeds chiefly on aquatic plants, but also seeks food on the land and is sometimes destructive to cultivated crops. It ranks next to the elephant as the bulkiest existing quadruped. Its land counterpart, the rhinoceros, is belligerent and dangerous.

Feeding of Game Birds and Animals Is Continuing

With the continued cold in all parts of Oregon the emergency feeding operations of the Oregon State Game Commission are continuing with unprecedented intensity. Baker, Union and Willamette counties are the scene of the most extensive activities. From 1000 to 1500 deer are being fed on the Keating range east of Baker, Oregon. Other areas of heavy feeding are the Pine Creek area, Burnt River area, Newbridge-Richland area, Troy, Baker, Sumpter and Starkey districts.

Fortunately better than two hundred tons of hay had been purchased by the Oregon State Game Commission before the hay shortage developed. The hay is being stretched as far as possible by adding concentrates. The keen demand for hay to feed stock has made it almost impossible to purchase more at the present time. C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor, stated that although feeding of deer and elk will never solve winter range problems, the department is using every means to meet this extreme emergency. District men are working from sixteen to eighteen hours a day, he continued. Many ranchers have also been hired on a temporary basis to assist the feeding. In the Keating area alone more than nine miles of road have been plowed out so that the stricken deer can be reached. In many other places the hay is being moved by sleds over the deep snow.

Mr. Lockwood also stated that sportsmen statewide have assisted greatly, especially in the feeding of game birds. Literally hundreds of cooperators are maintaining feeding stations for pheasants, quail, huns and other birds. Many tons of grain have been donated including an outstanding donation of eight tons from Liskey Brothers of the Klamath area. District agents had also reported the purchase of more than ten tons of grain a week ago.

John McKean, chief of upland game for the Commission stated that although it is an impossible task to reach all of the birds the work is being concentrated in the most acute areas. In addition to many broadcasting stations that have been established, one hundred feeders have been constructed and have been placed into operation. The feeders are being used experimentally and it is hoped they will supply the grain to the birds without the large loss that comes when snow covers feeding stations. Although some work is being done in almost all the counties, the most critical areas are located in Wallowa, Baker, Union, Klamath, Harney, Umatilla and Grant counties.

The day was celebrated as a typical American Christmas holiday with two fully decorated Christmas trees in the company area. The highlights of the day were church services and a holiday feast at which the main course was turkey.

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Lions Overcome Early Lead to Beat Lebanon 41-31

The Cottage Grove Lions overcame an early Lebanon lead to douse the Warriors, 41-31, with comparative ease here Tuesday night in an inter-division game.

After the district 7 champs had held a 7-6 first period lead, Harlan Mickey, Grove forward, paced a second quarter drive that completely overwhelmed the Warrior quintet. It was in this period that he scored 9 of his 14 points, which was high for the evening.

Tanner, Warrior guard, was high point man for Lebanon and continually gave the Grove defense headaches. He had 11 points, followed by Herbert, also of the Warriors, with 9.

The win, although it didn't change district standings, was impressive on the point of improved Lion ball handling and teamwork. It was the second loss to district 6 rivals by the Warriors. The first was to Junction City last week. They are undefeated in their district.

Lion Coach, Bob Dusenberry, used substitutes in almost the entire final quarter after the regulars had run up a 31-17 third period lead.

Bob Cook, Grove center, opened scoring with two gift shots after 30 seconds were gone. From there on the teams exchanged basket for basket with the Lebanon five landing on top of a 7-6 first quarter score.

The Lions, paced by Mickey, came roaring back in the second canto and dunked in 13 points to command a 19-12 half lead.

Working as a team the local five swished 12 more points thru the net from all sides in the third period and at the same time allowed the Warrior team only 5, to give themselves a 31-17 third quarter lead and put the game on ice.

The subs, although a little shaky, showed much promise, and owt freshmen got their first varsity outing. Both Bill McBee and Wes Malcomb proved they could shoot and handle the ball with the best of them.

The high school band and drill team were present to entertain the packed house during the half and quarter intermissions. The arrival of new bleachers enabled everyone to find a seat and relieved the former cramped spectator space.
